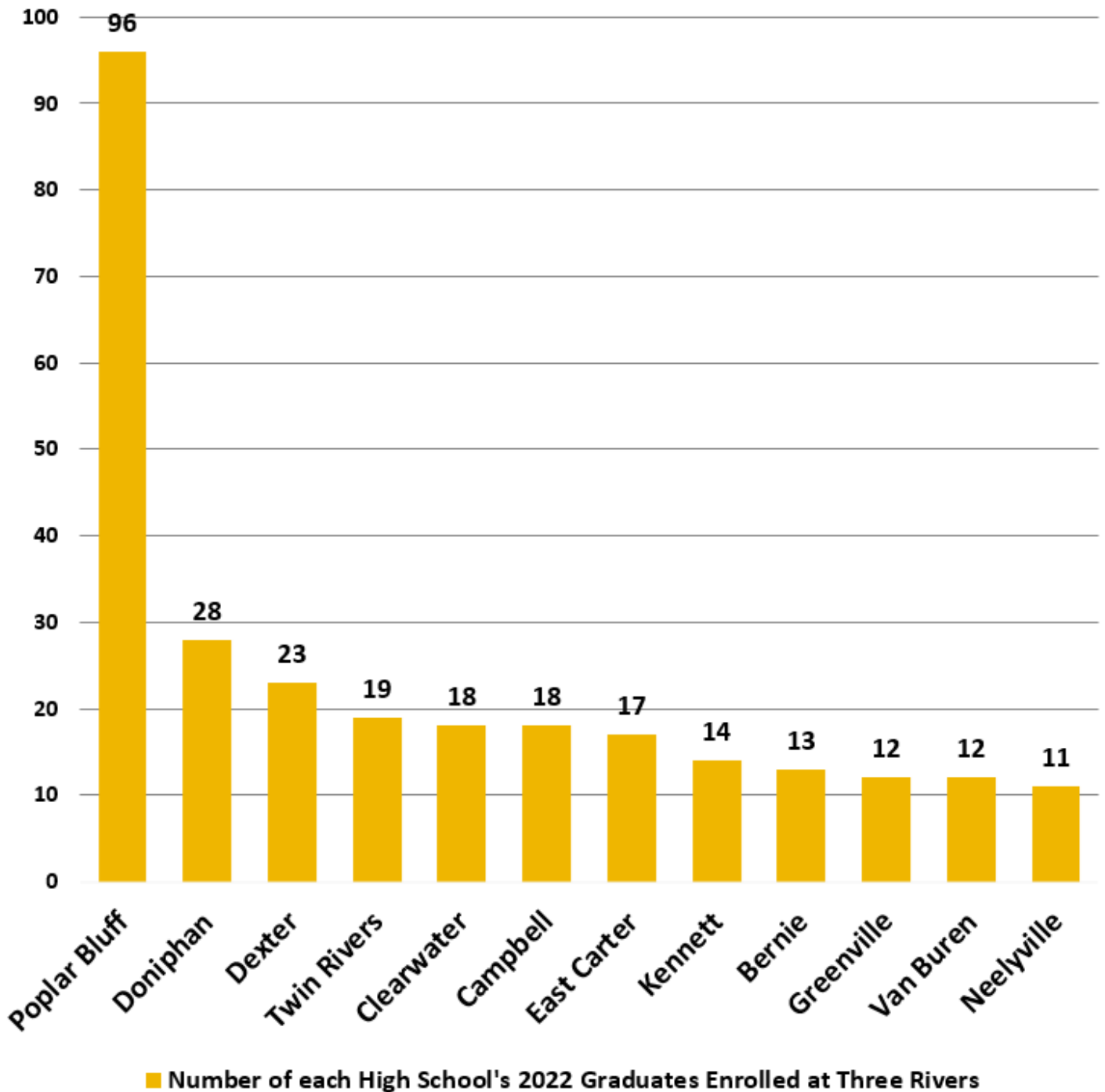

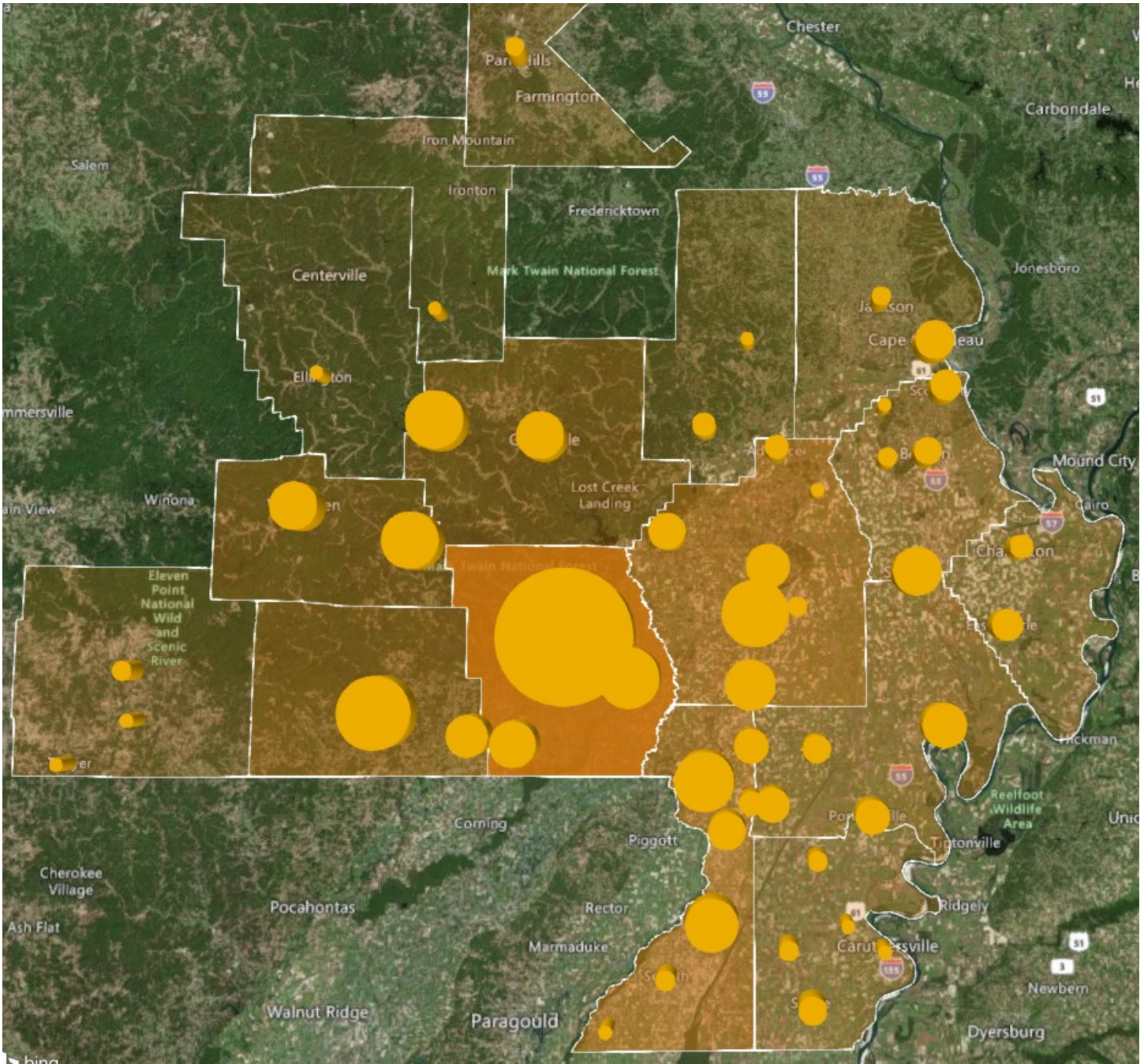
Percentage of May 2022 High School Graduates Enrolled in 22/Fall by High School

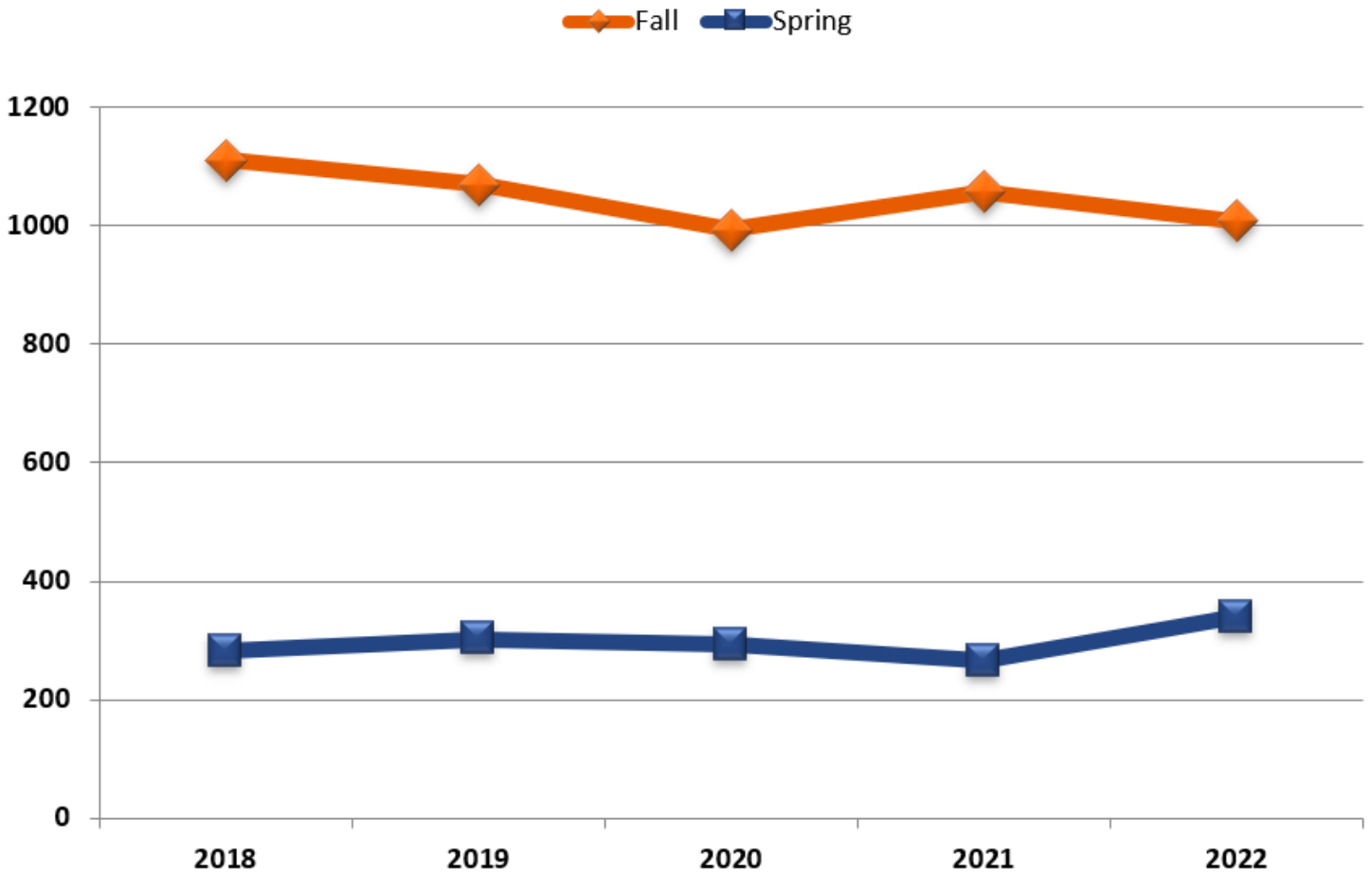
### Enrollment by High School City & County

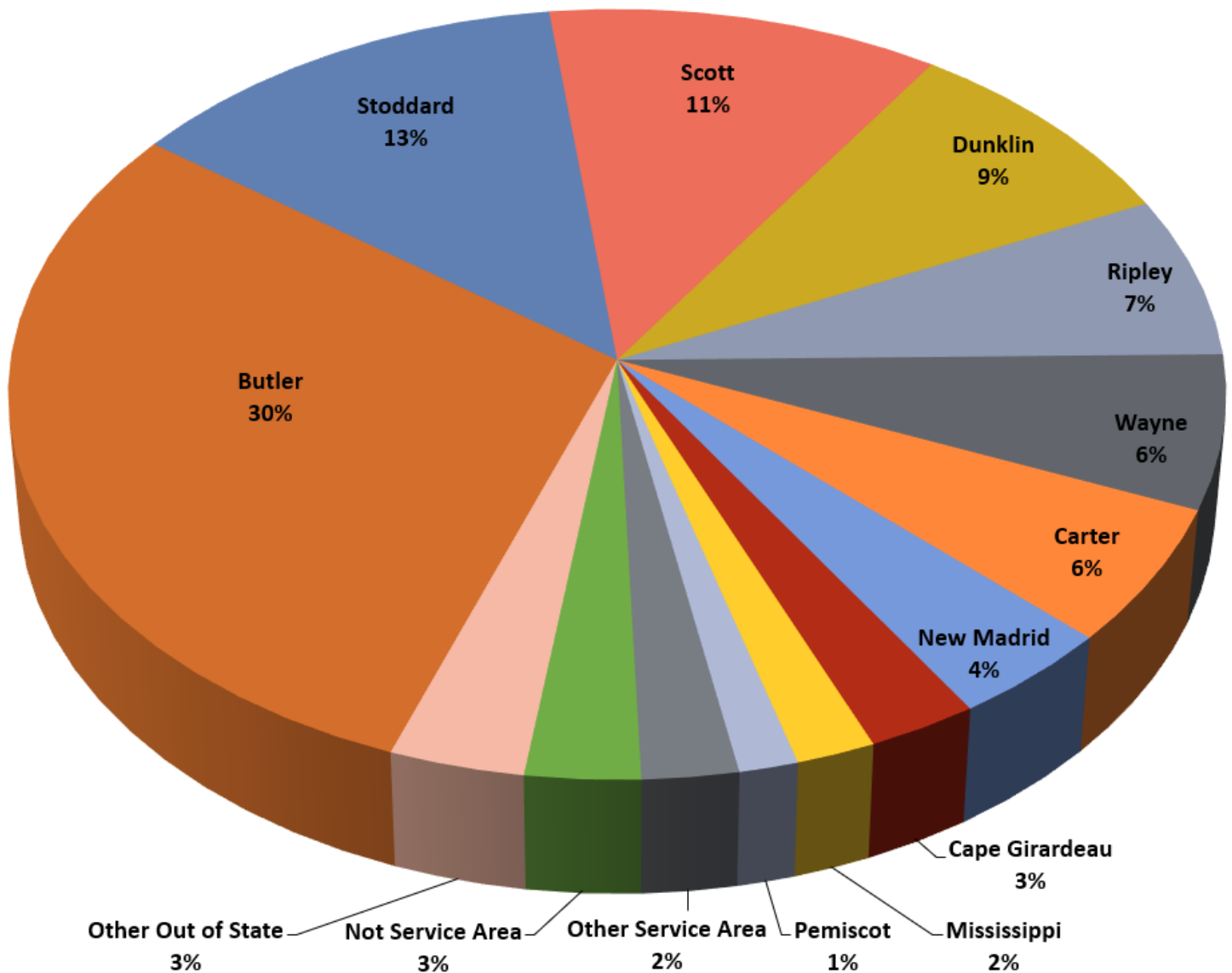

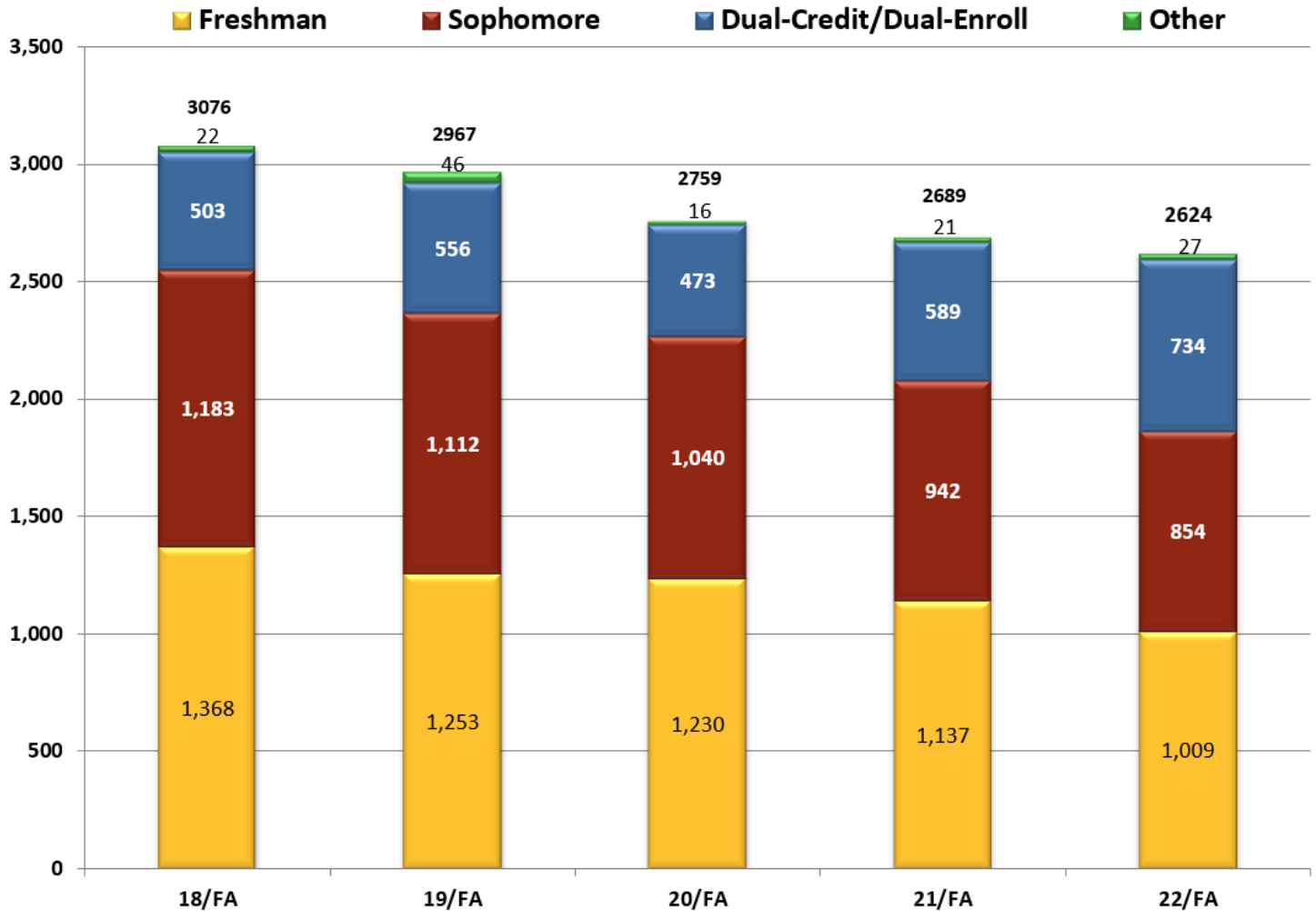

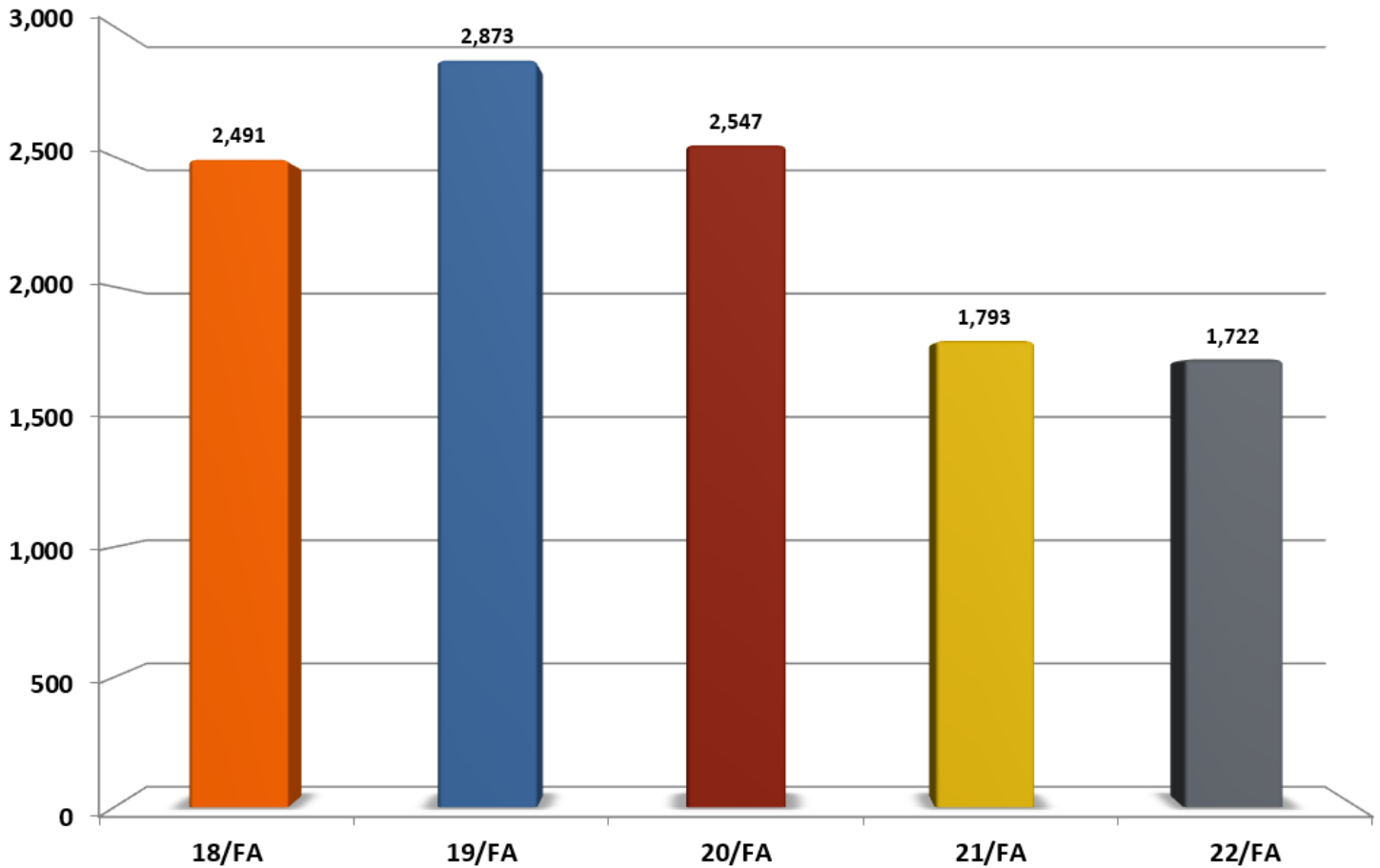

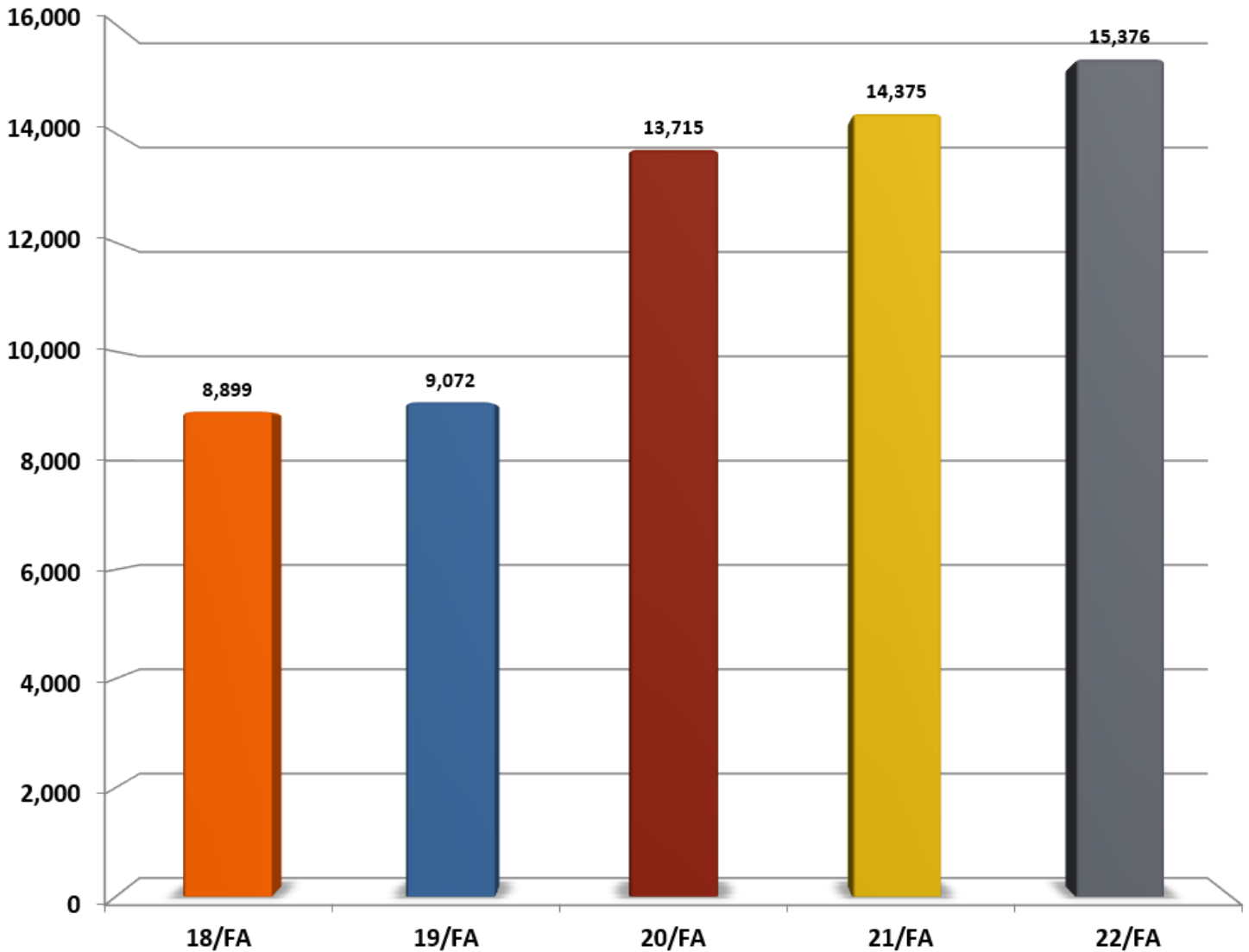

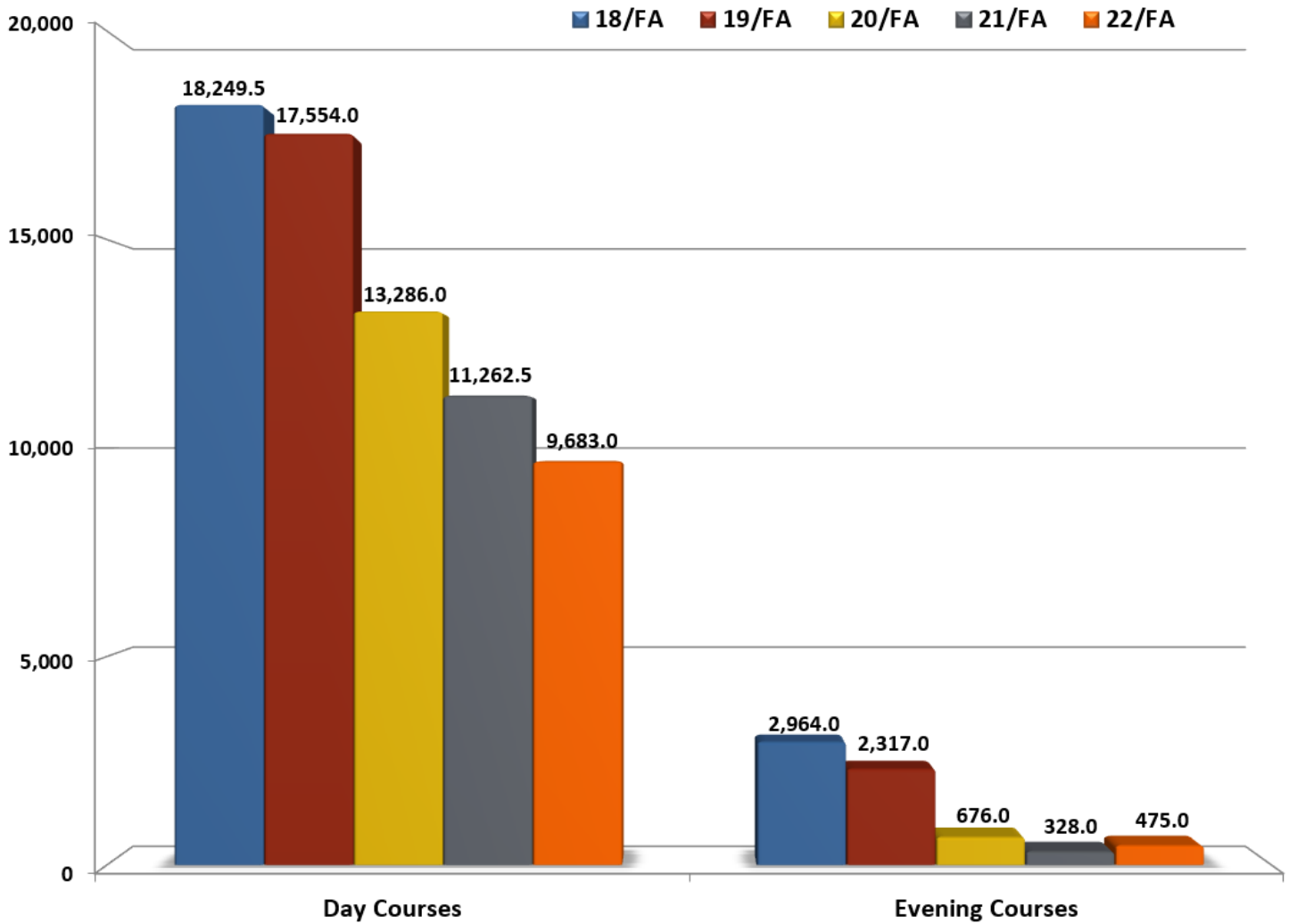

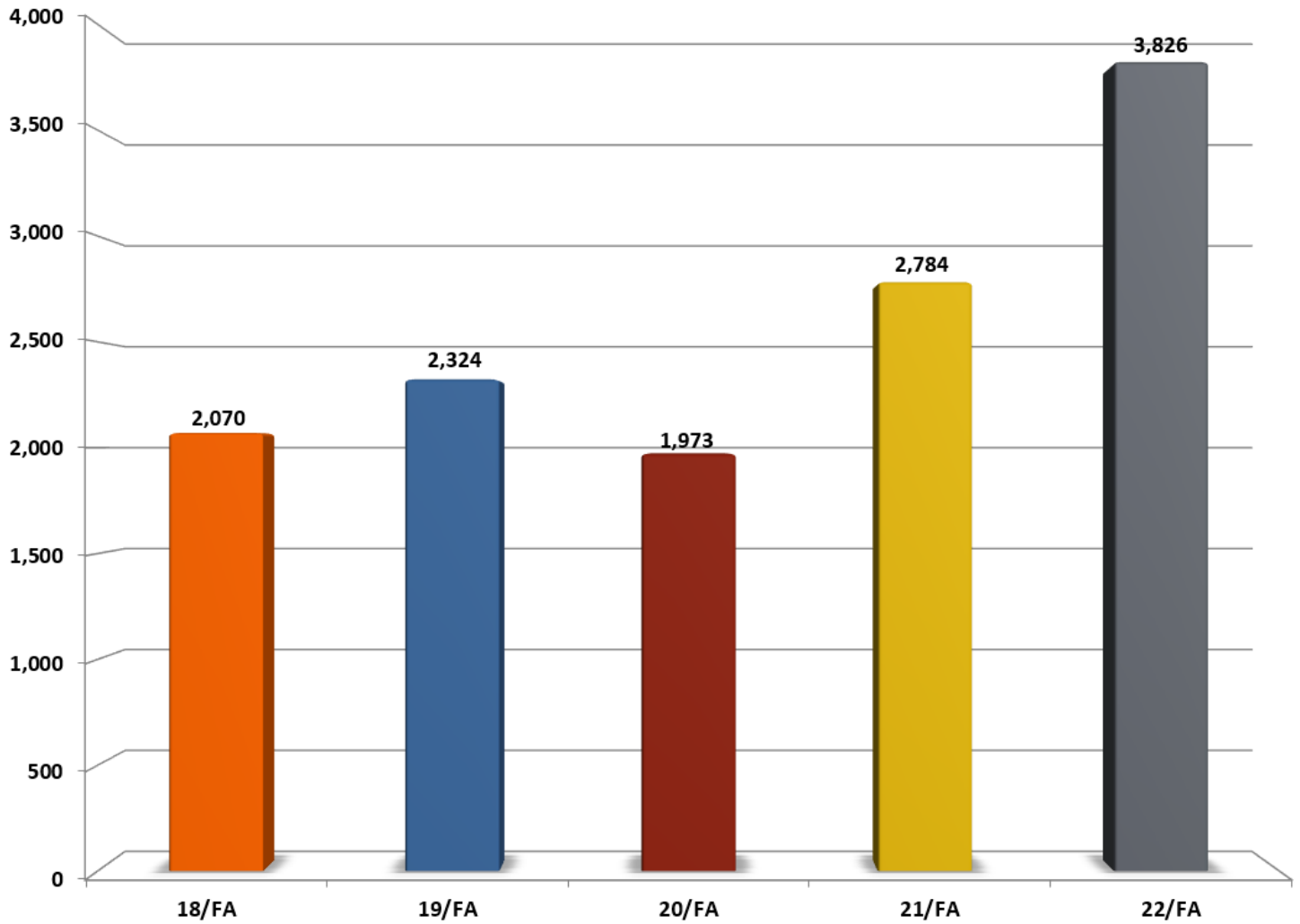

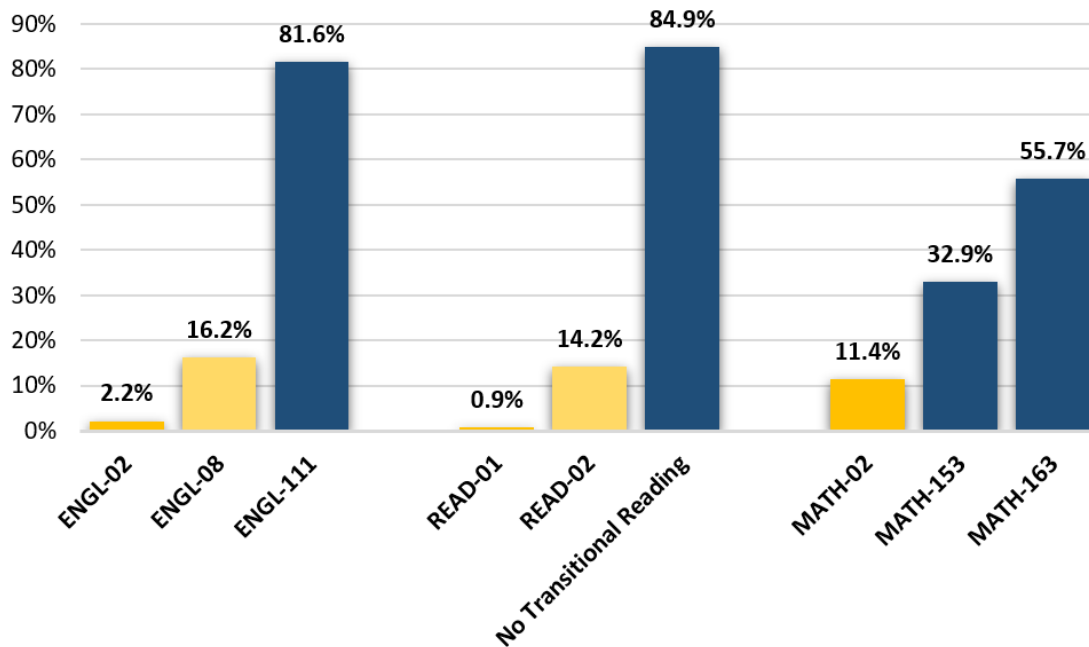
## 22/FALL FIRST-TIME STUDENTS

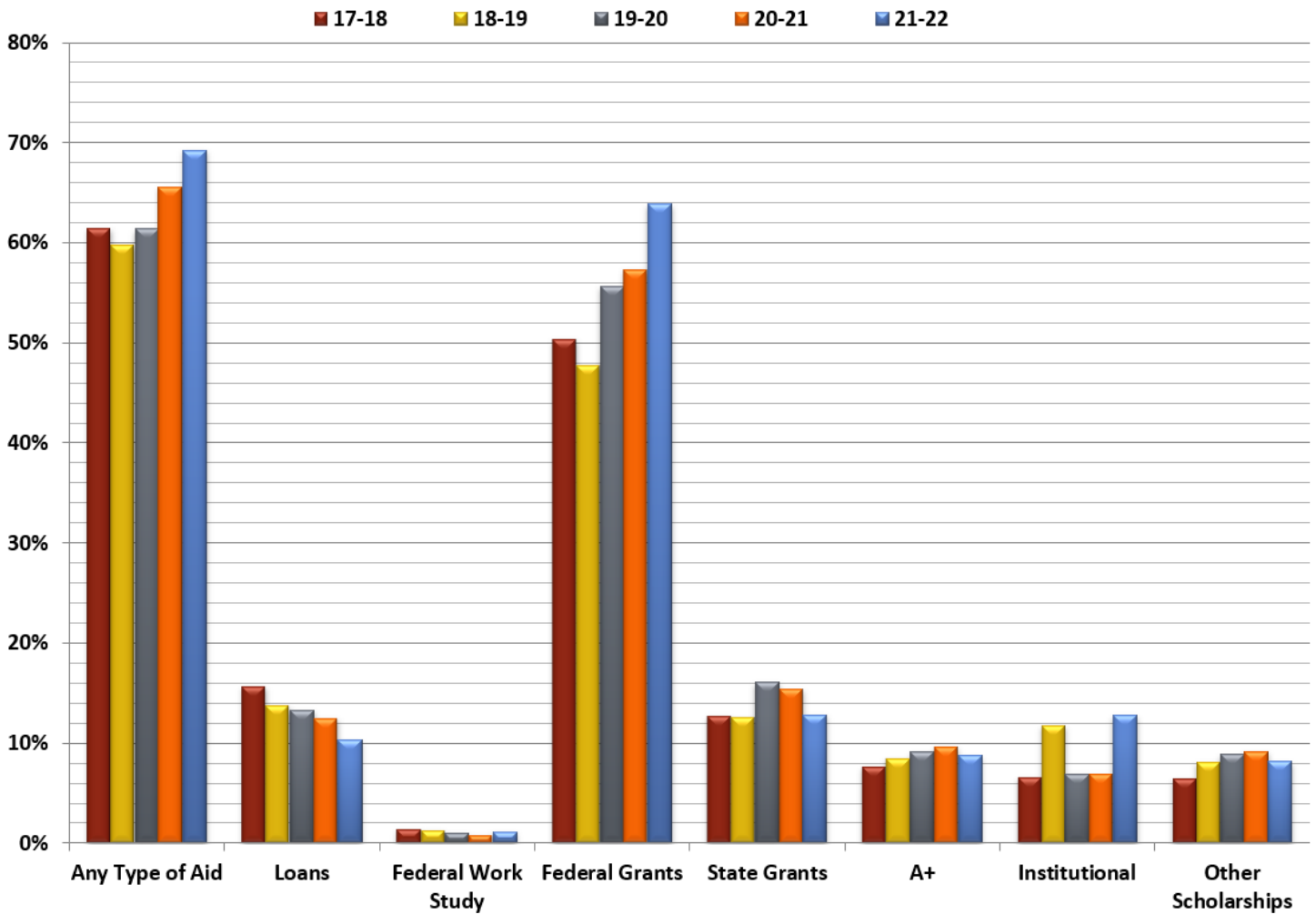

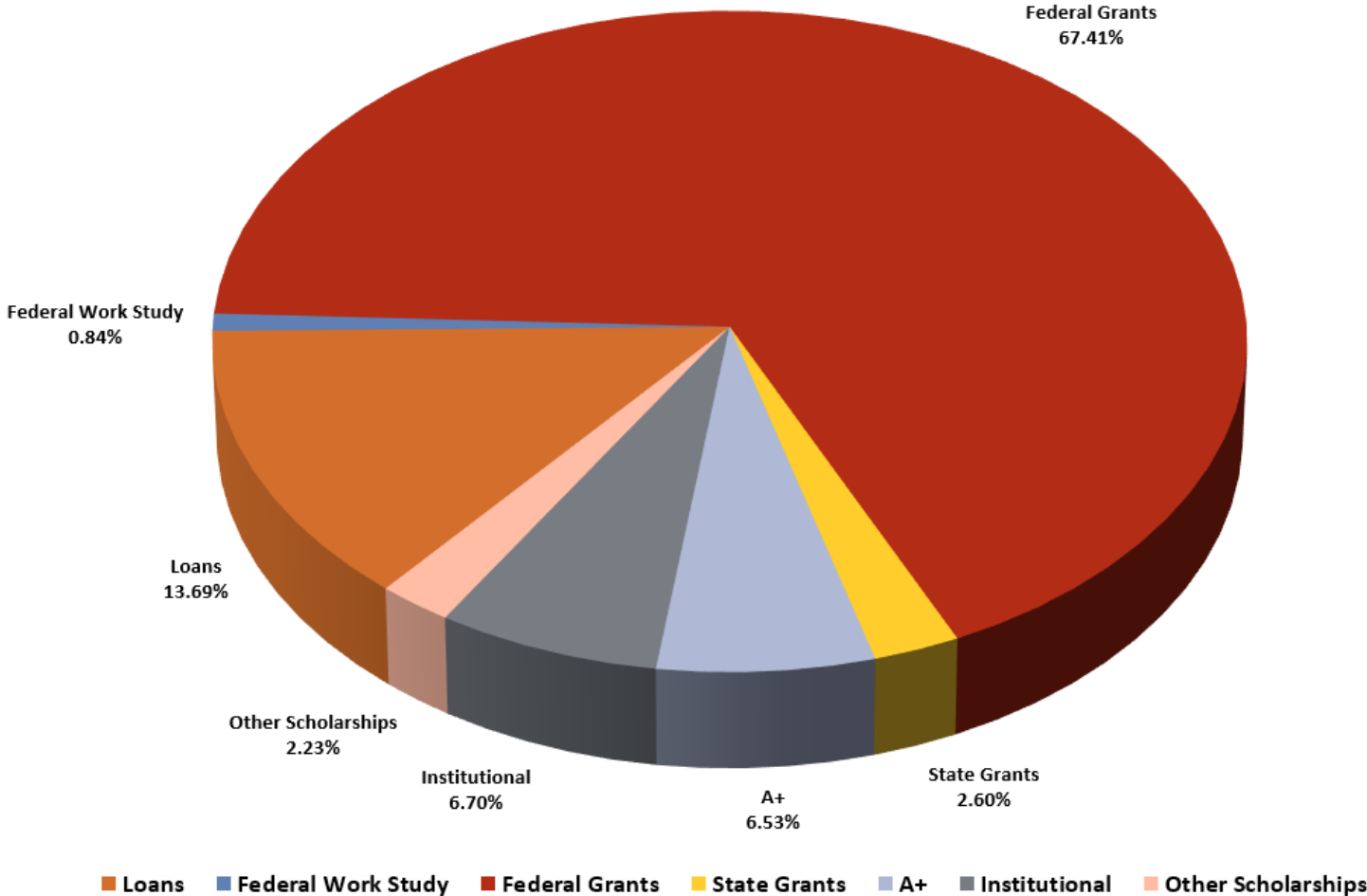

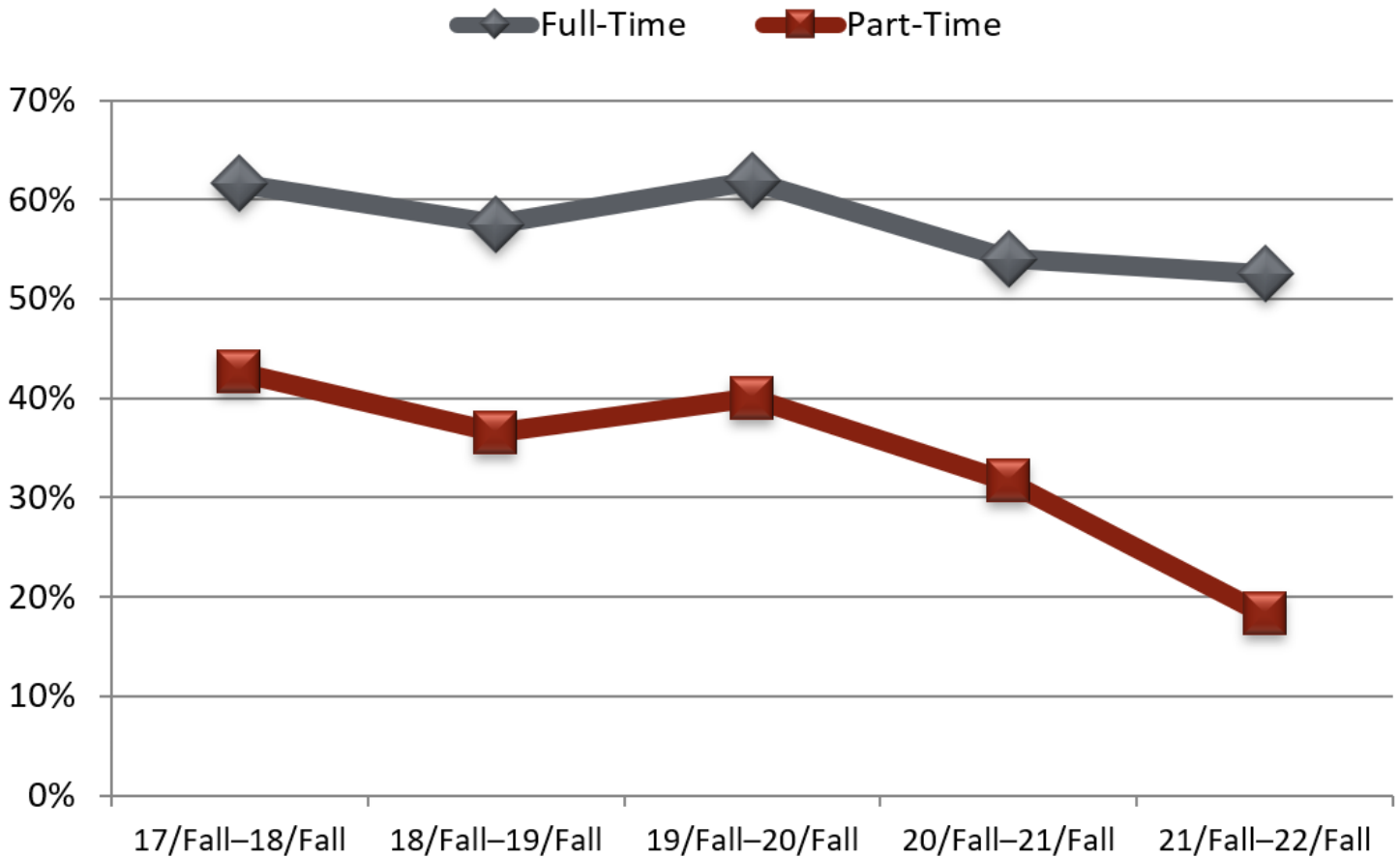
## PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL DOLLARS AWARDED

## FIRST-TIME STUDENT COHORT\*

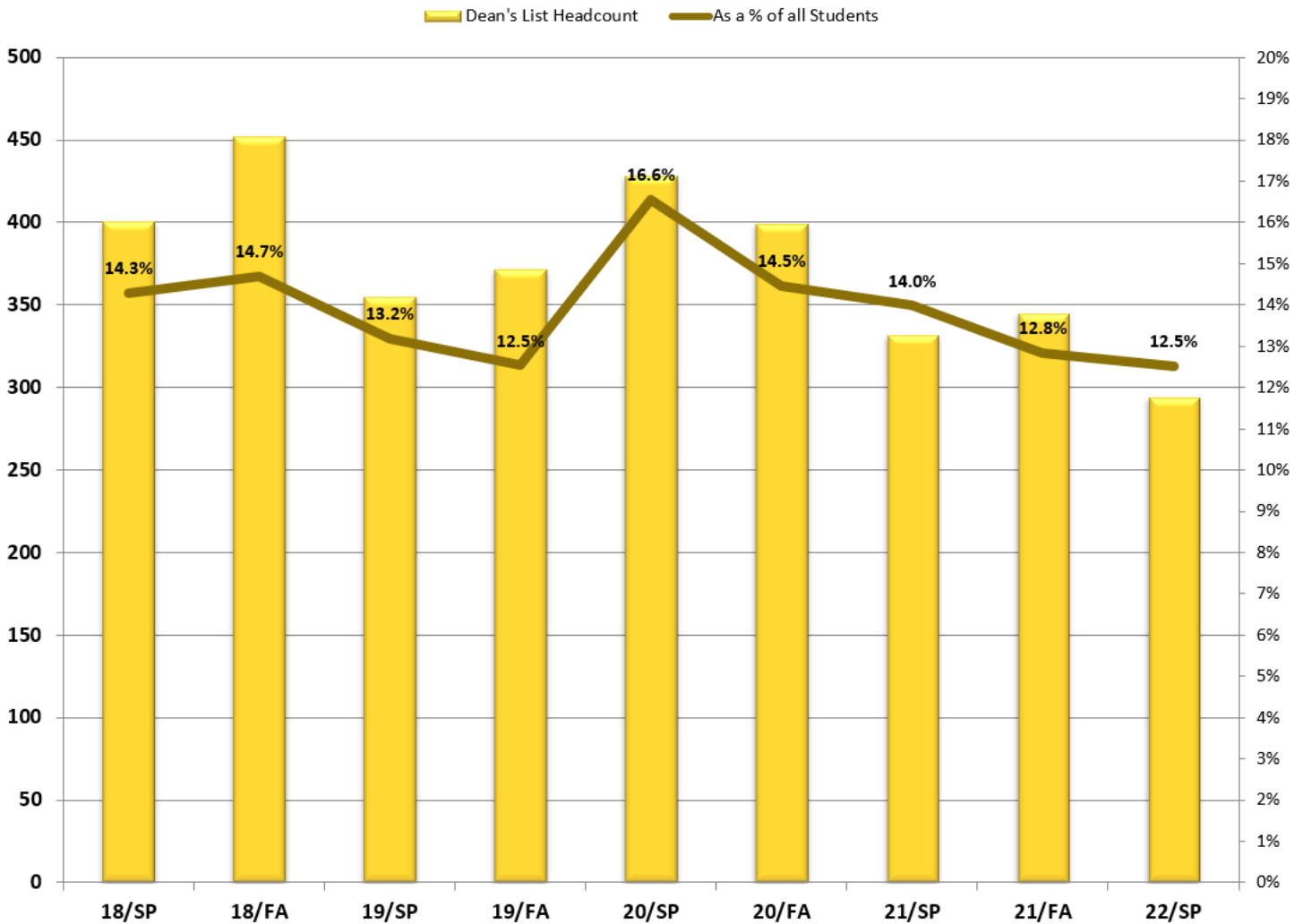

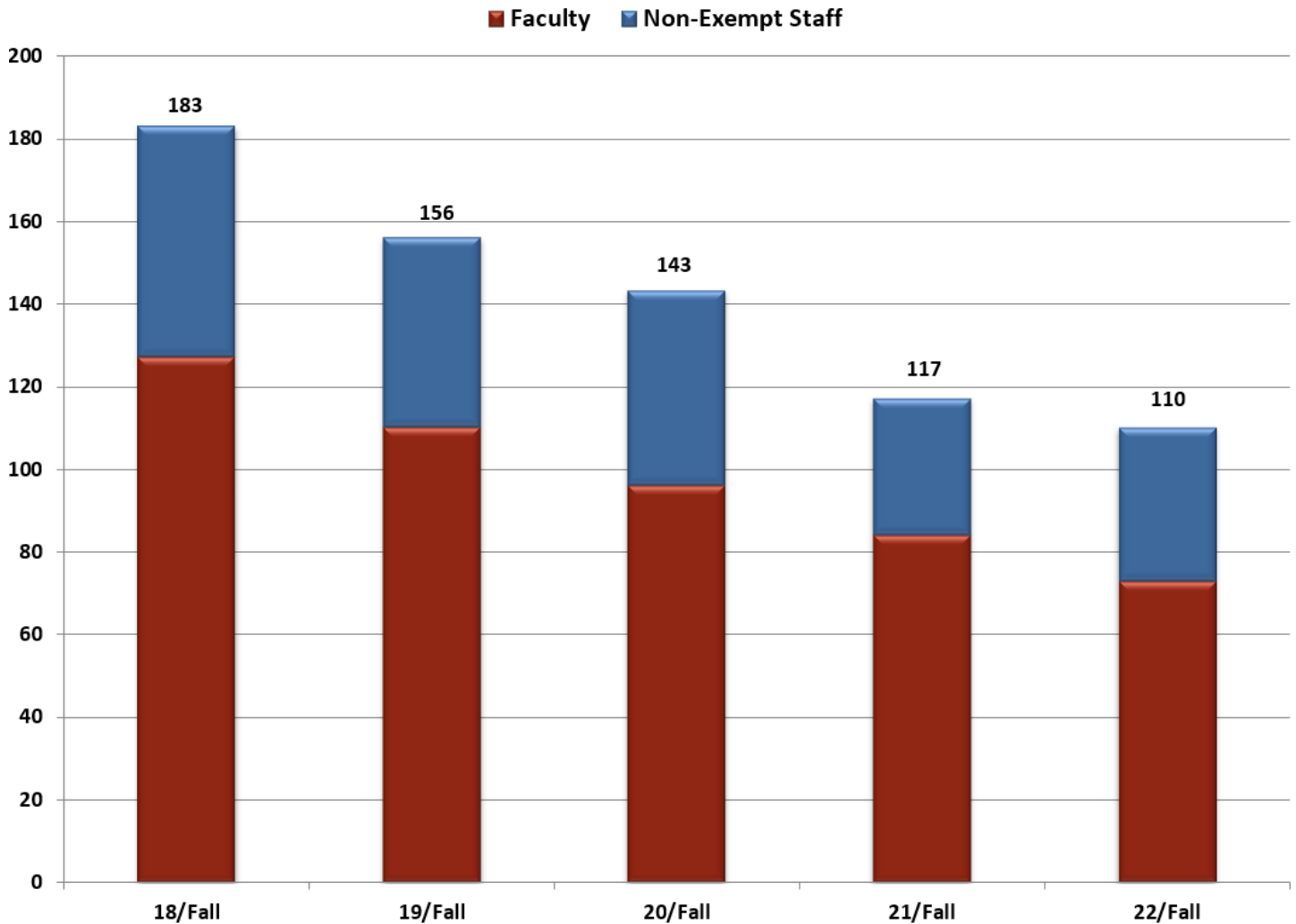

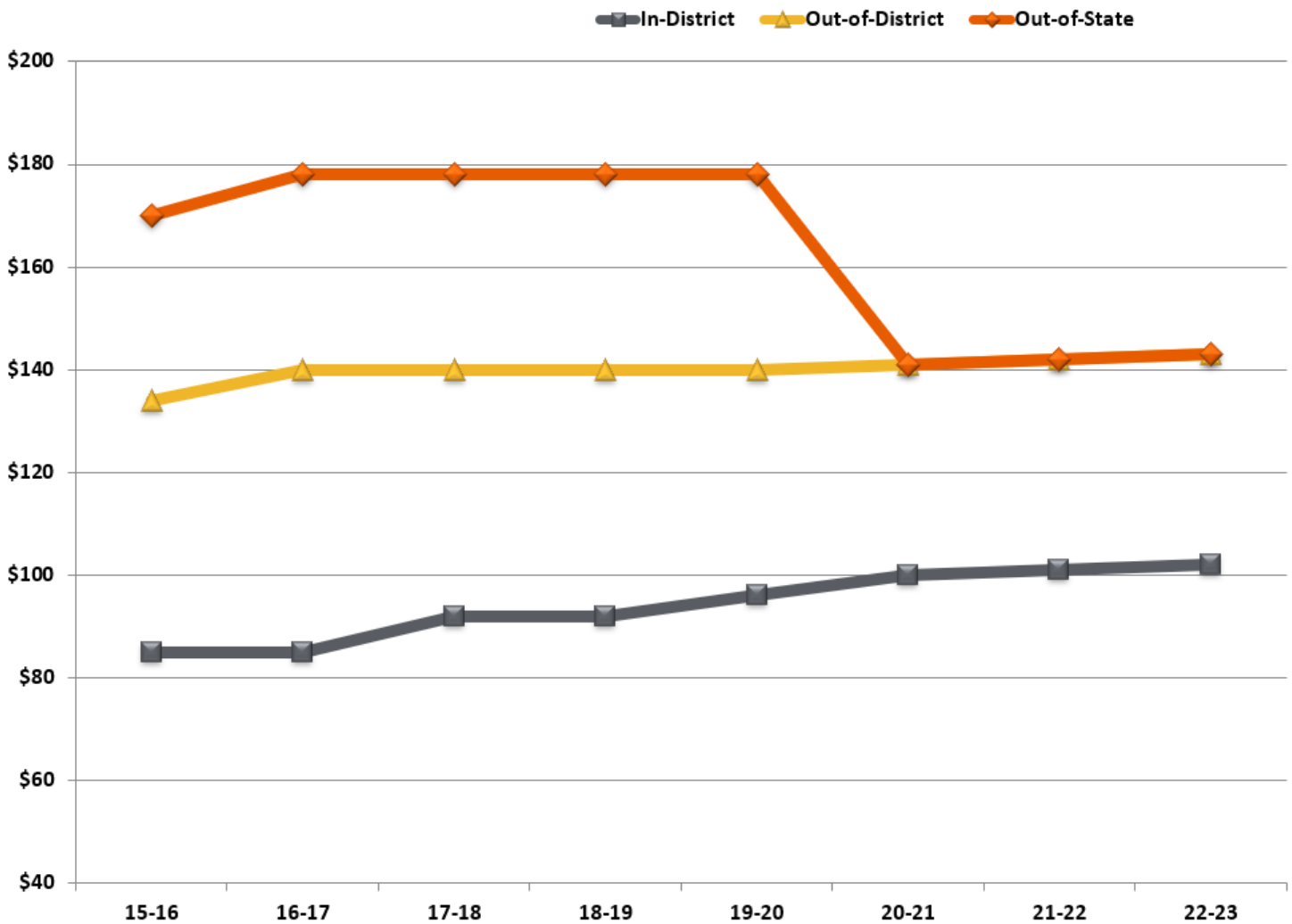
