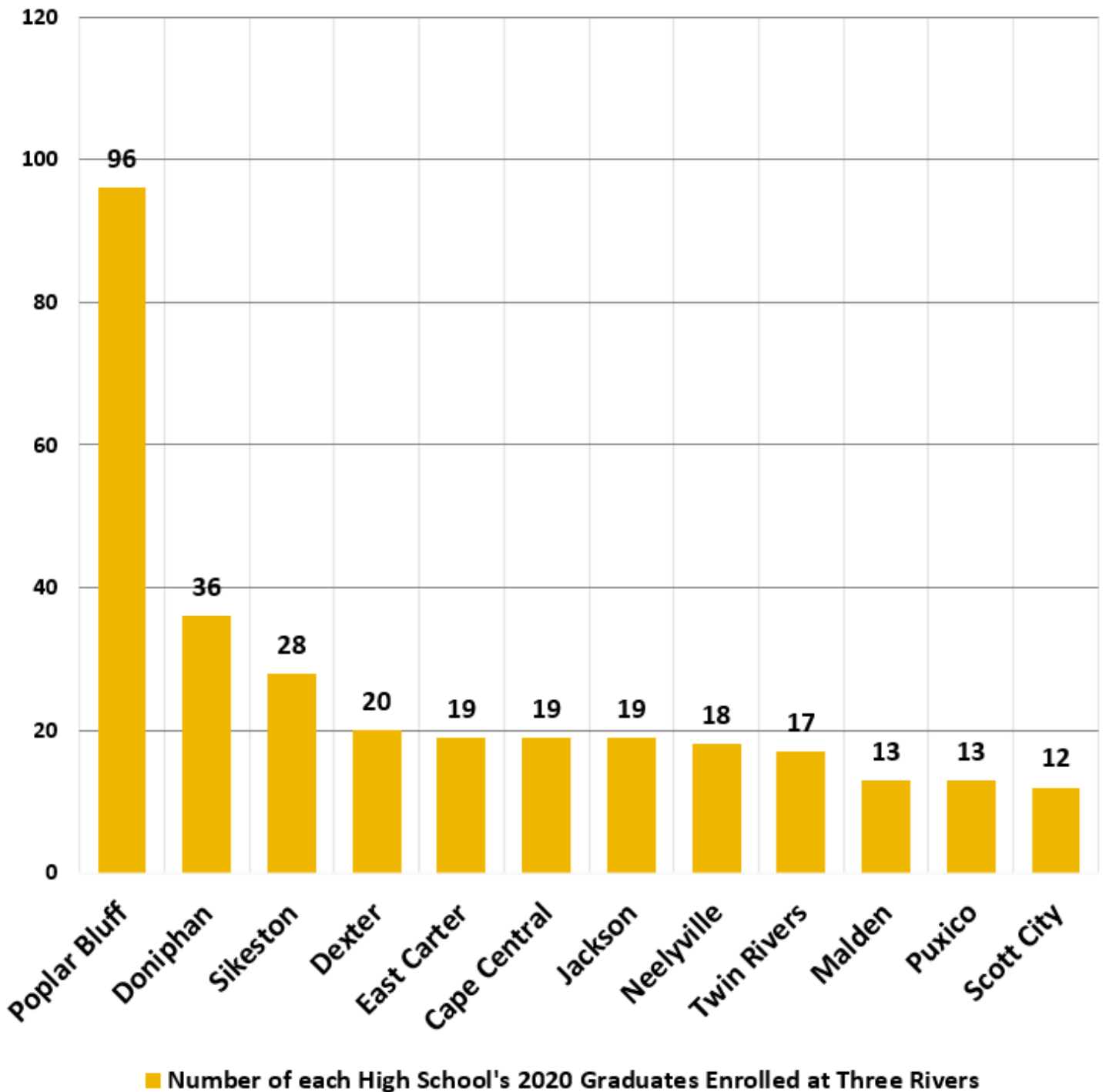

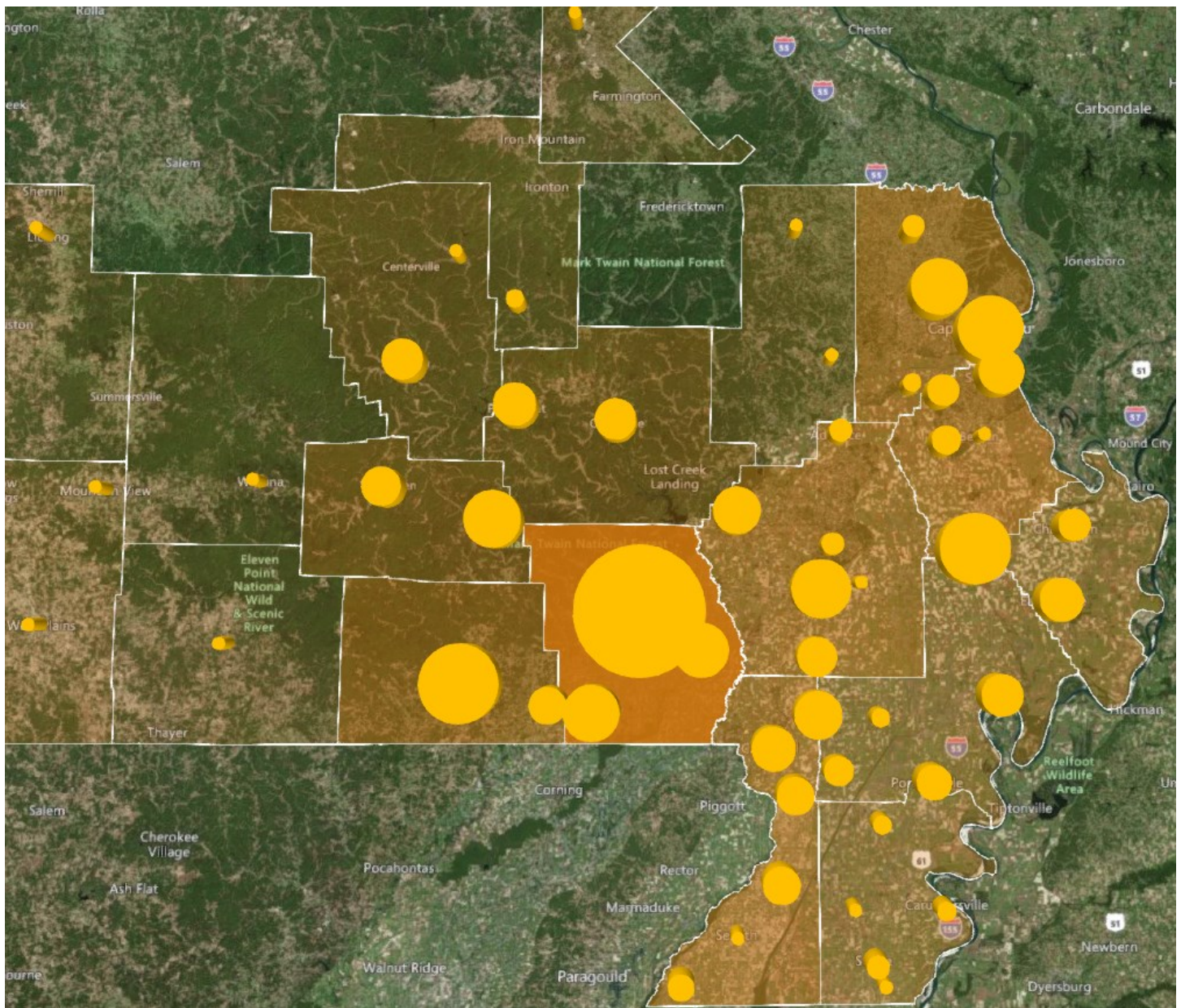

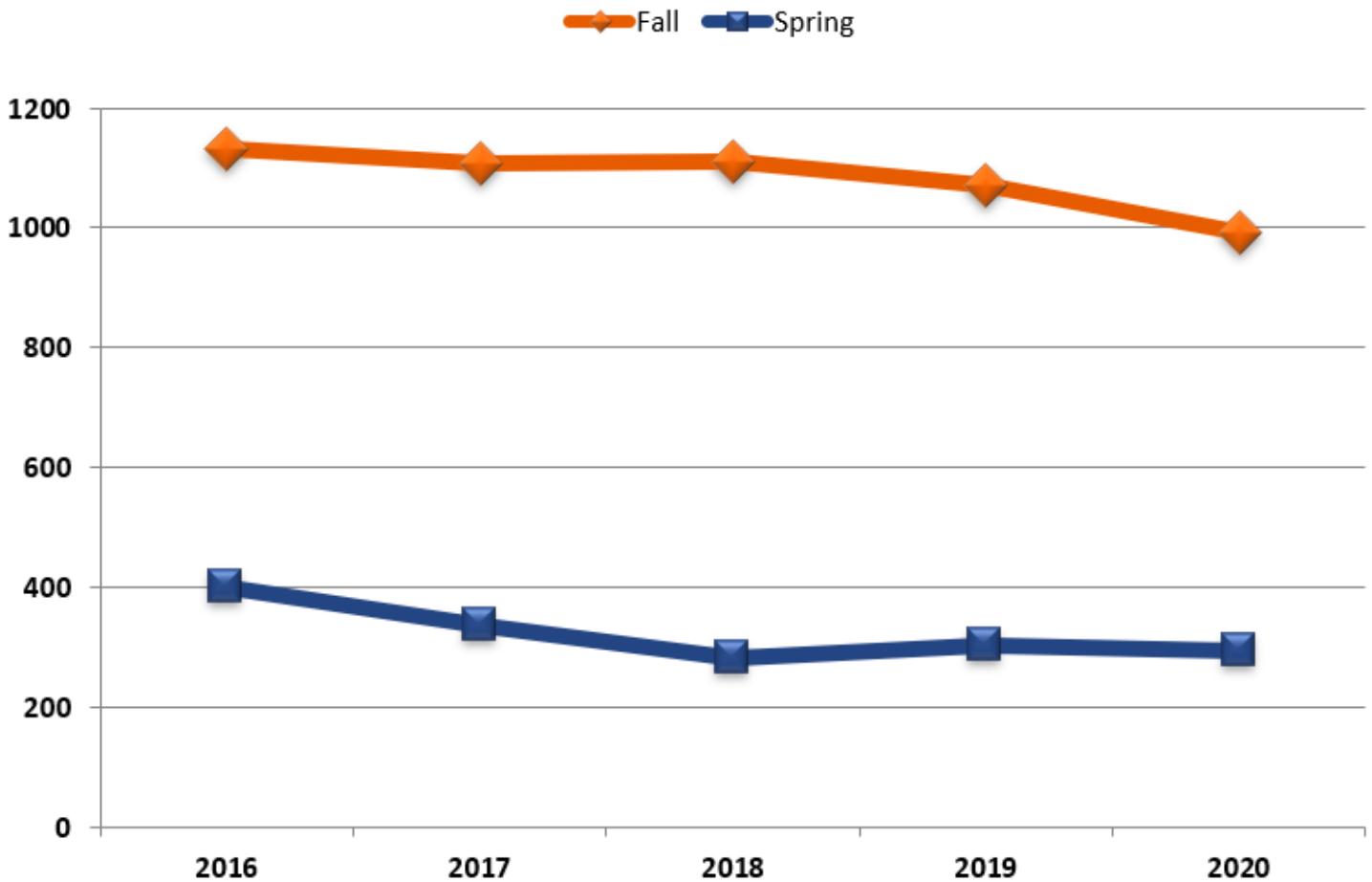
Enrollment by High School City & County

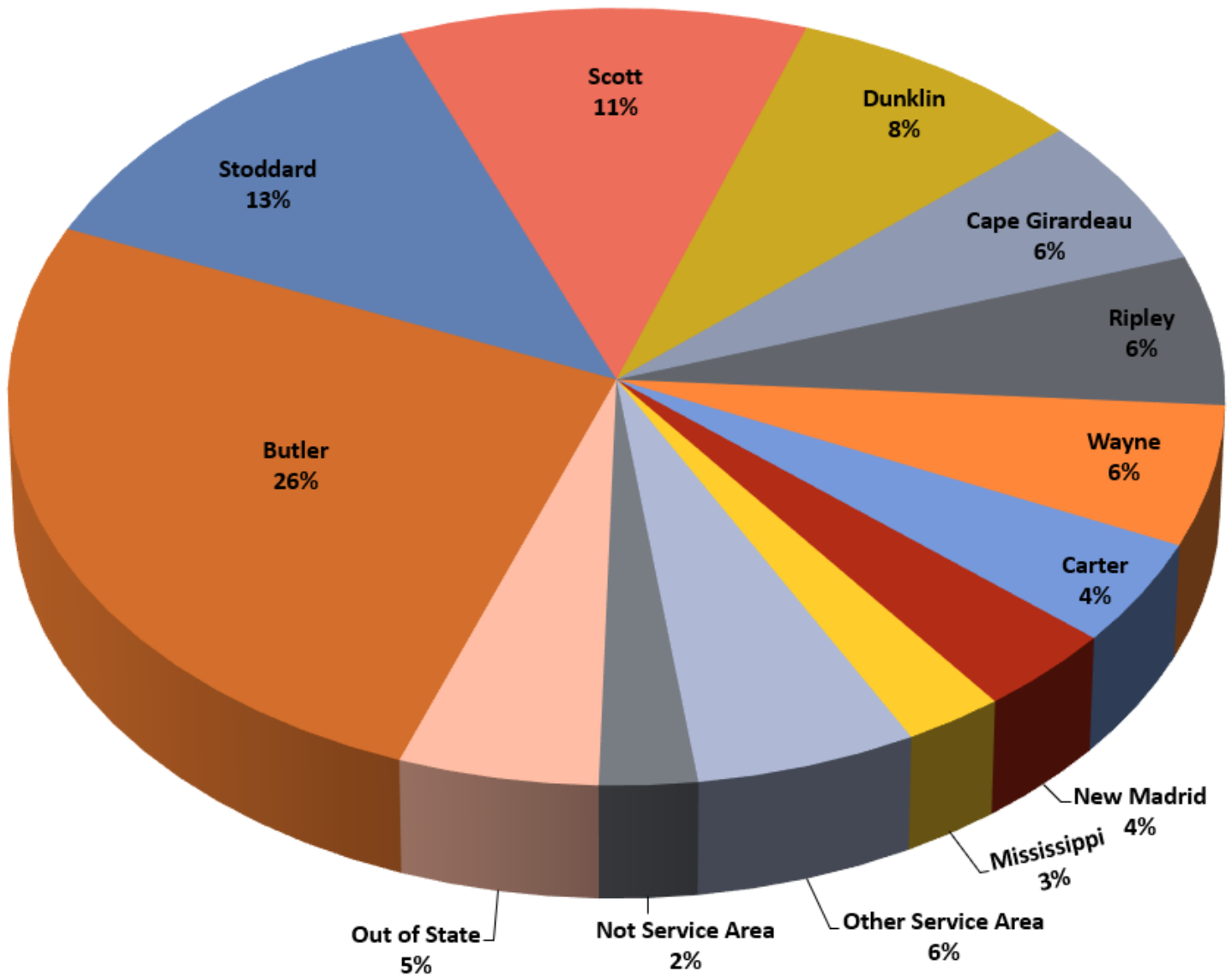

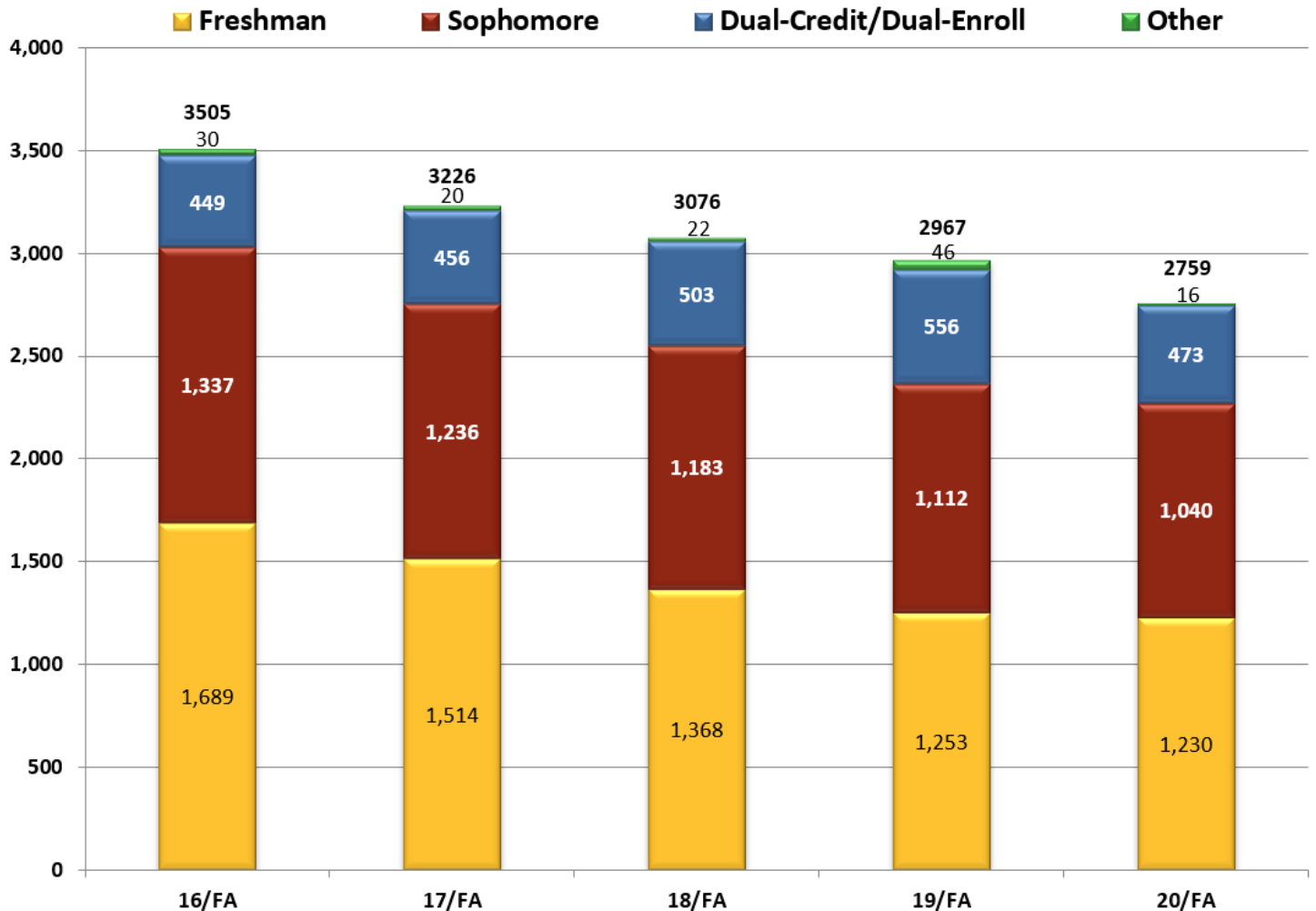

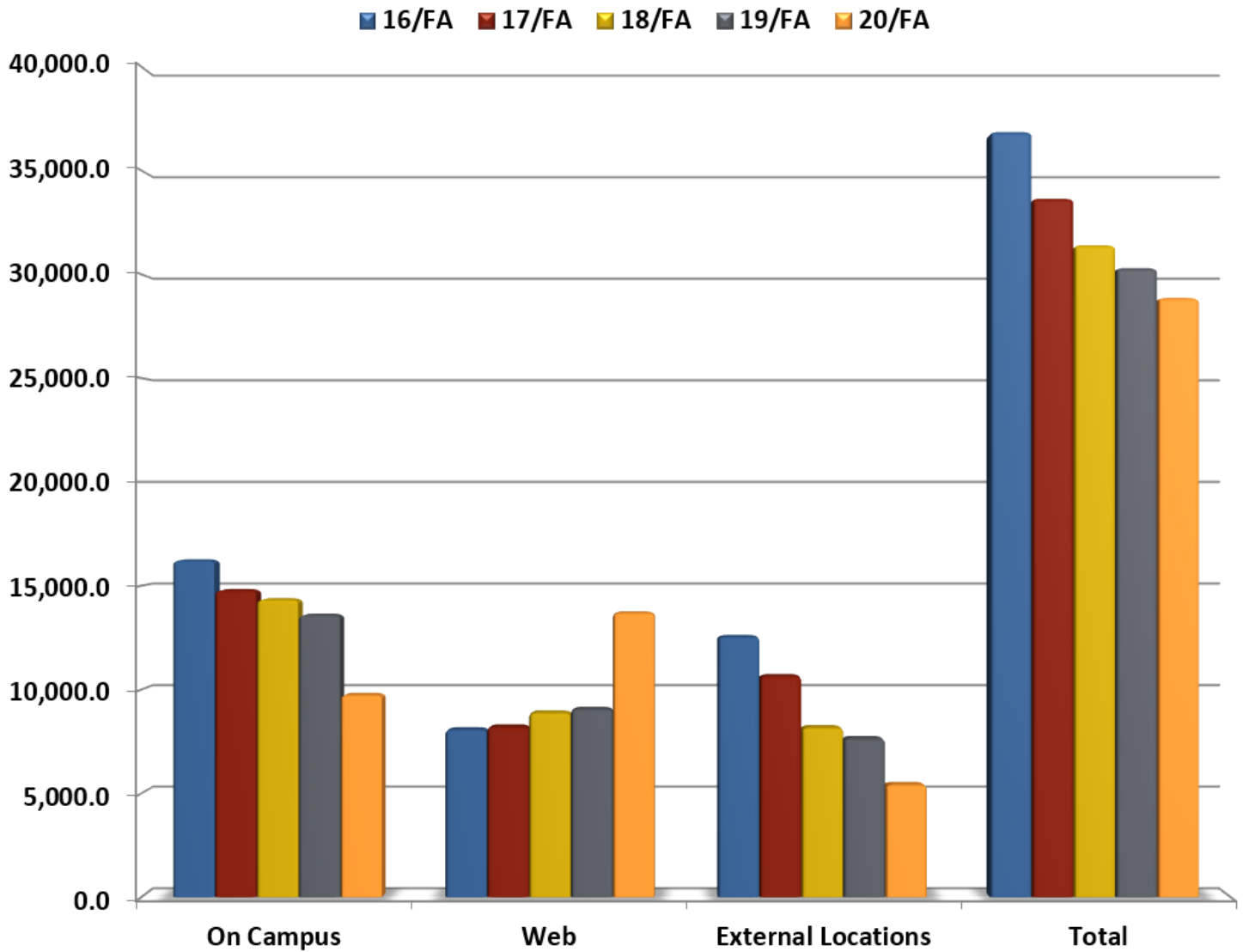

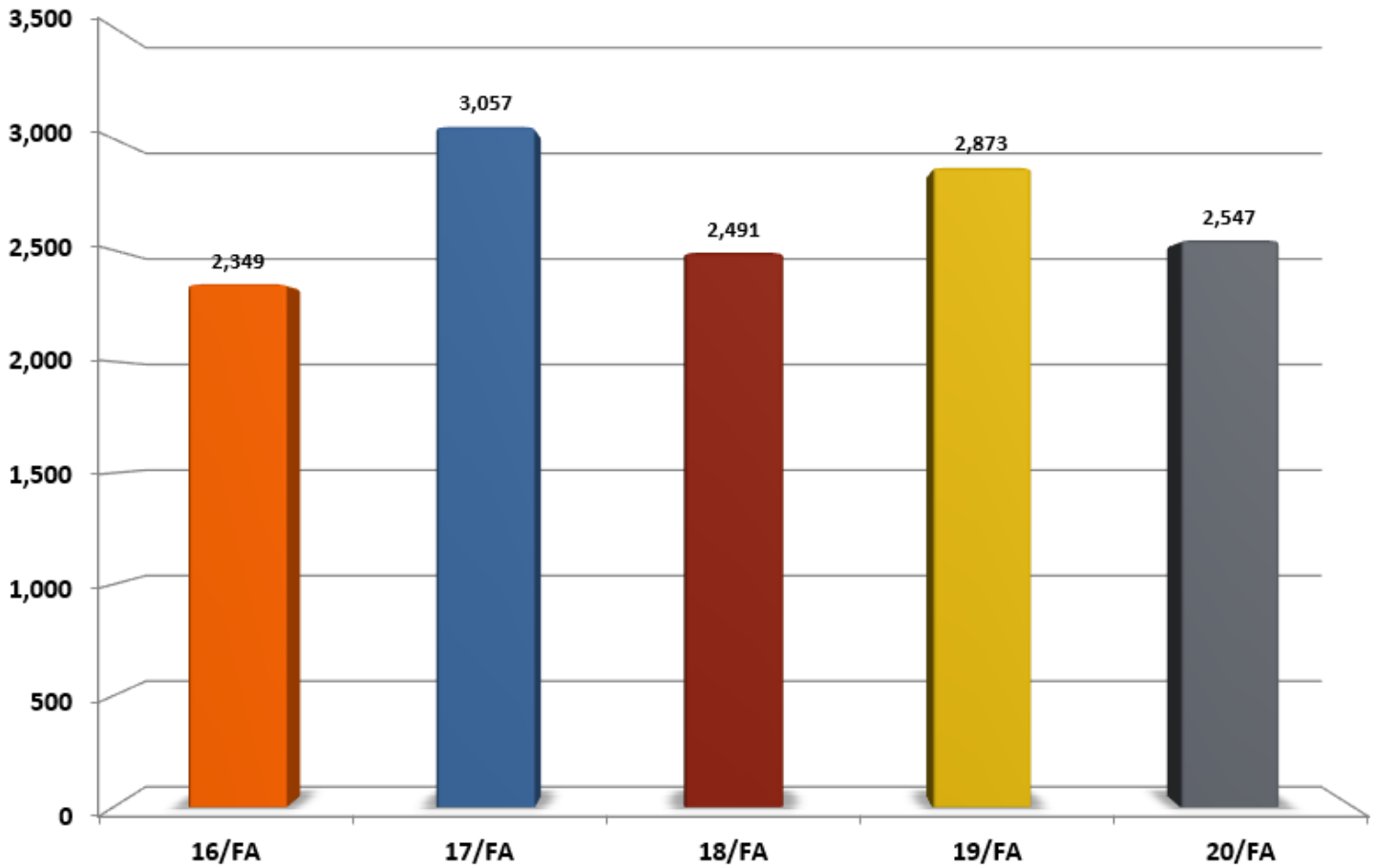

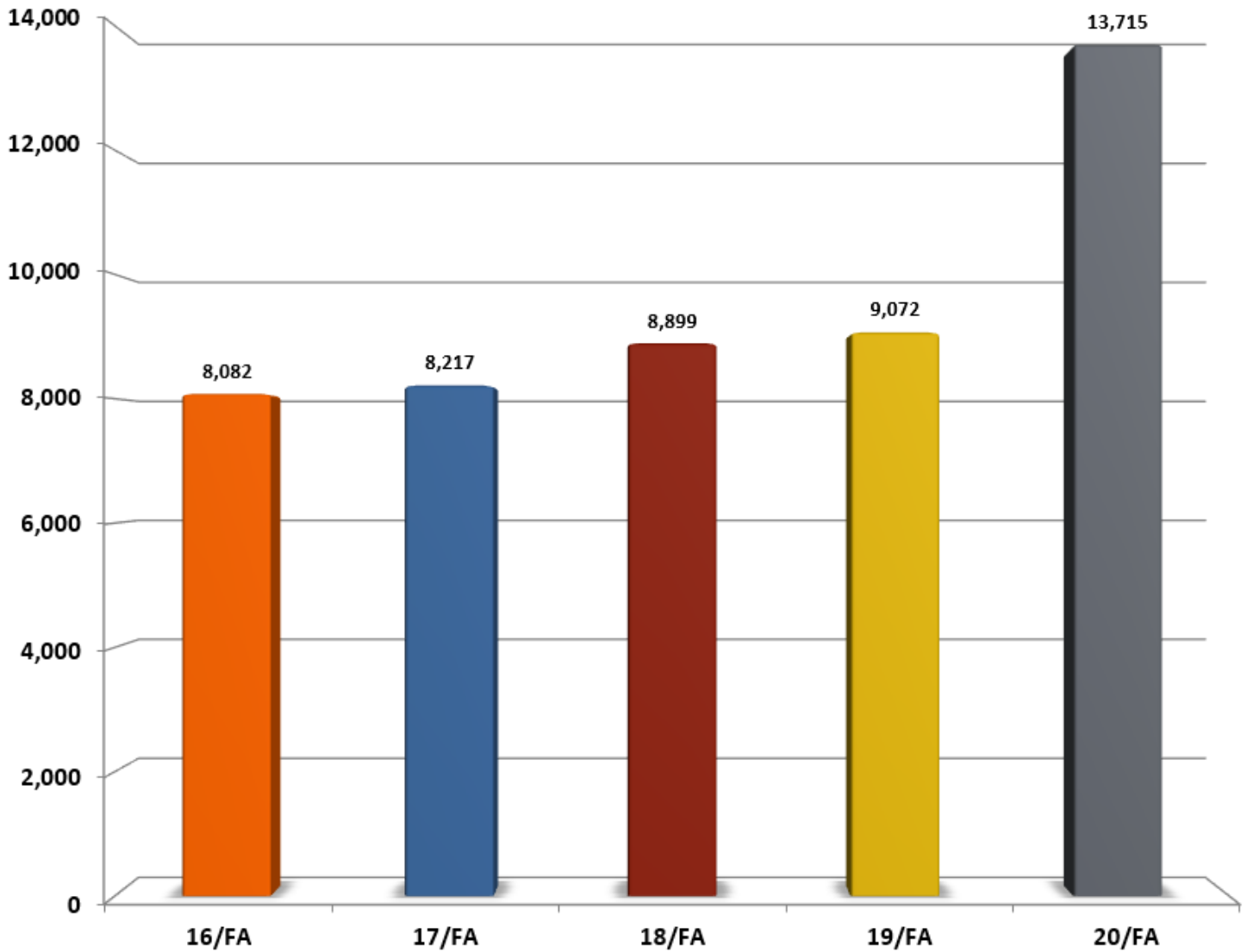

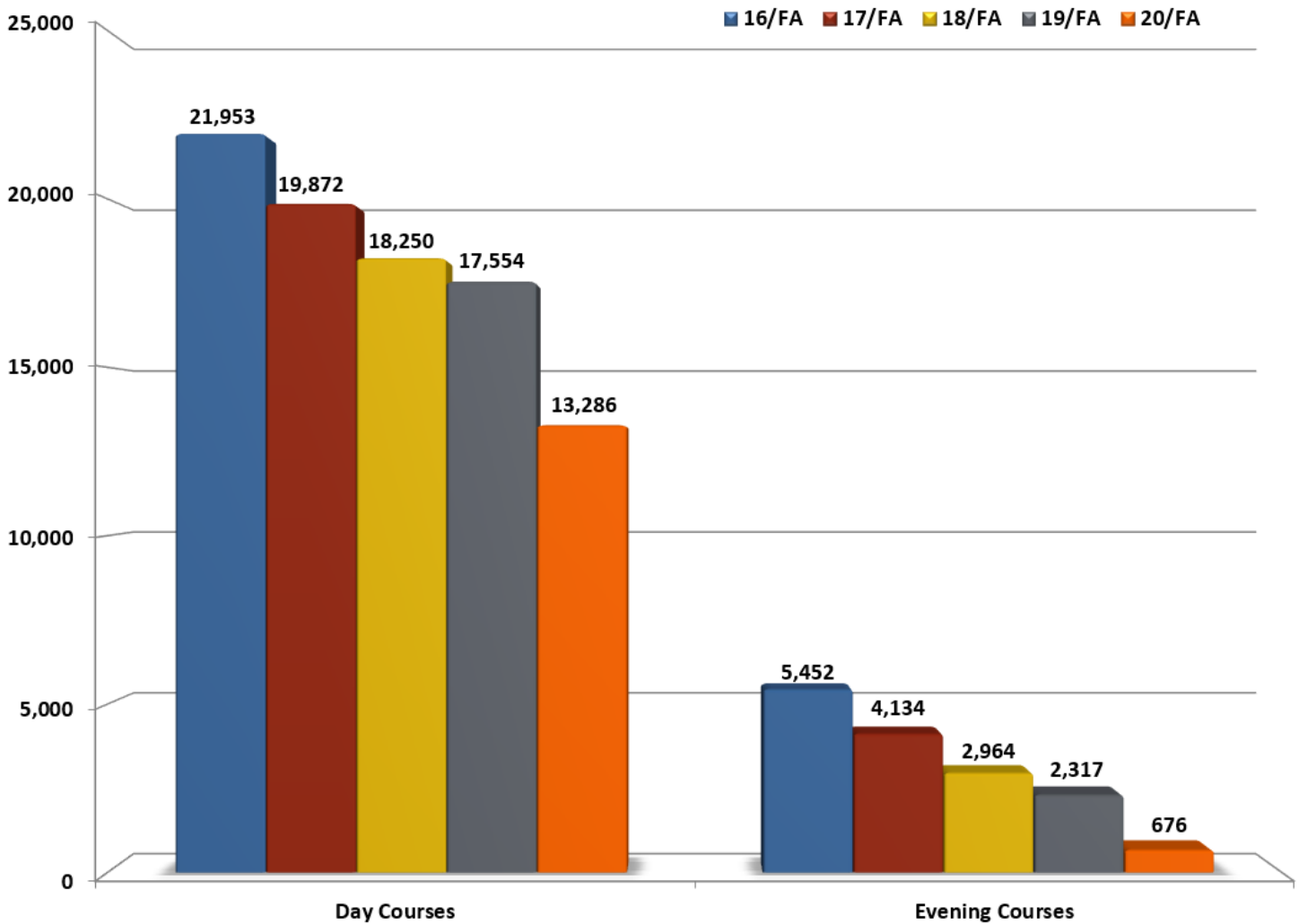

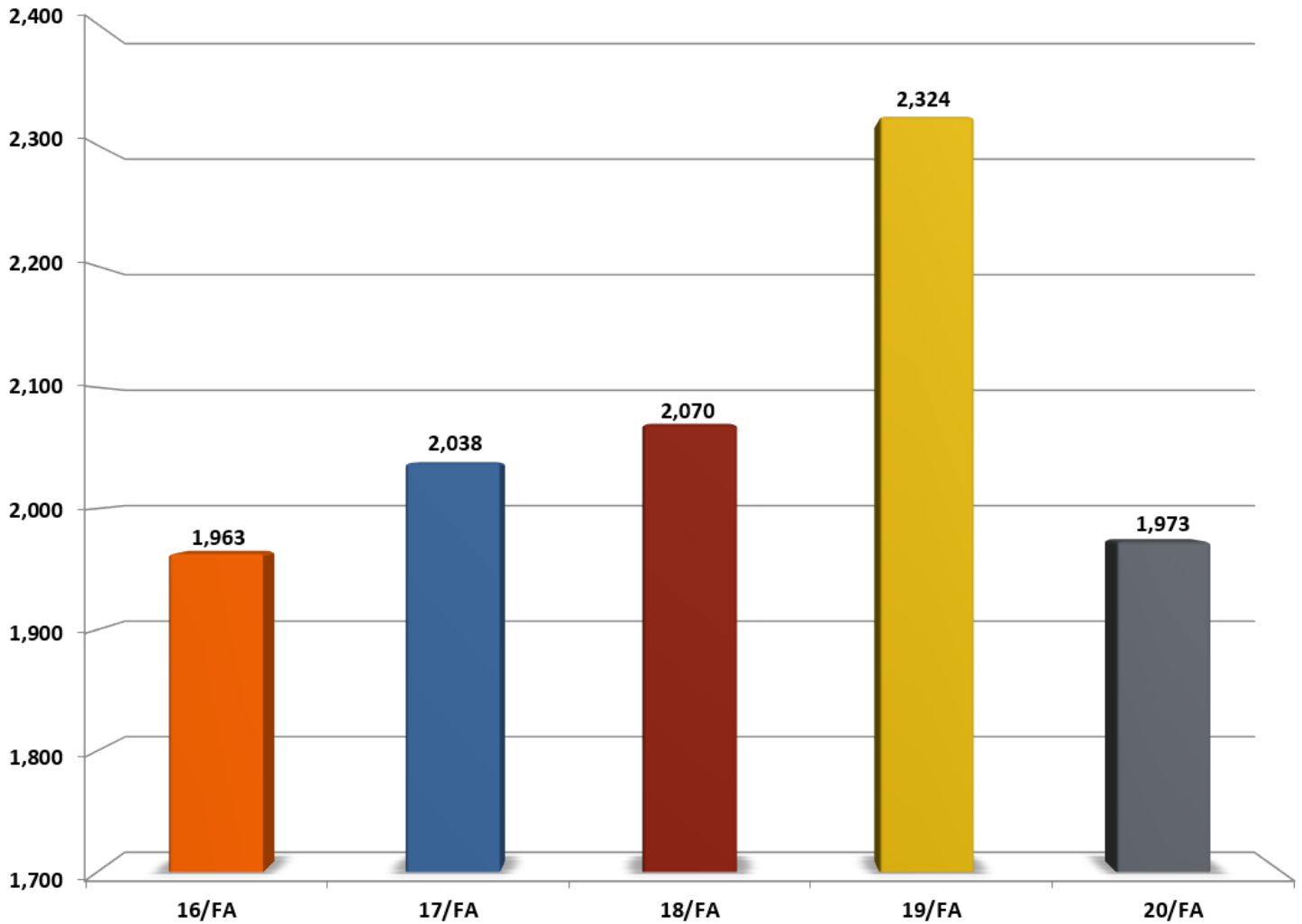

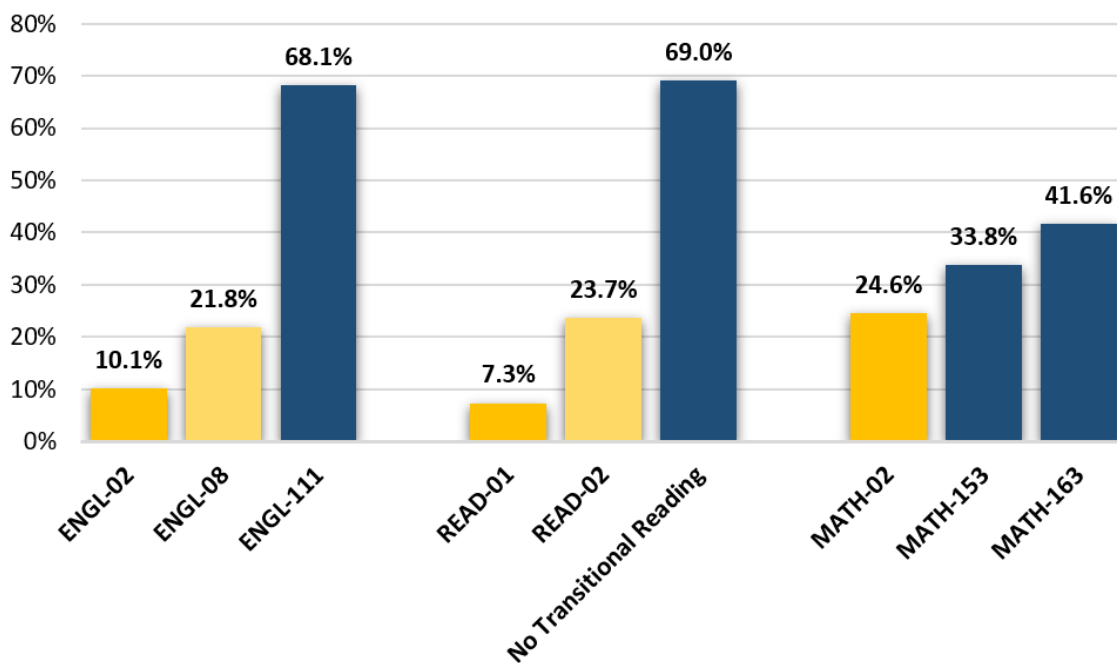
20/FALL FIRST-TIME STUDENTS

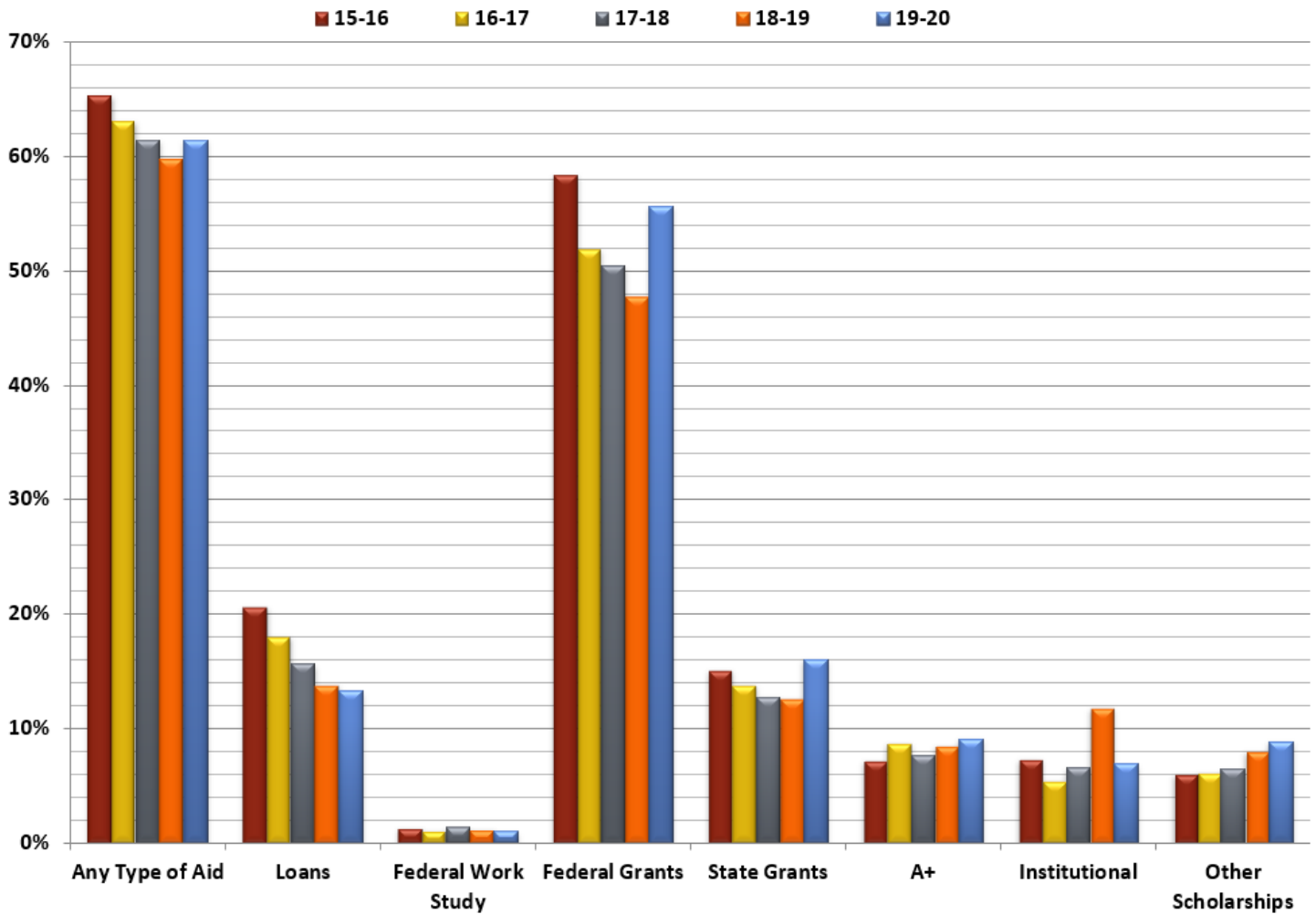

PERCENTAGE OF ALL STUDENTS RECEIVING AID



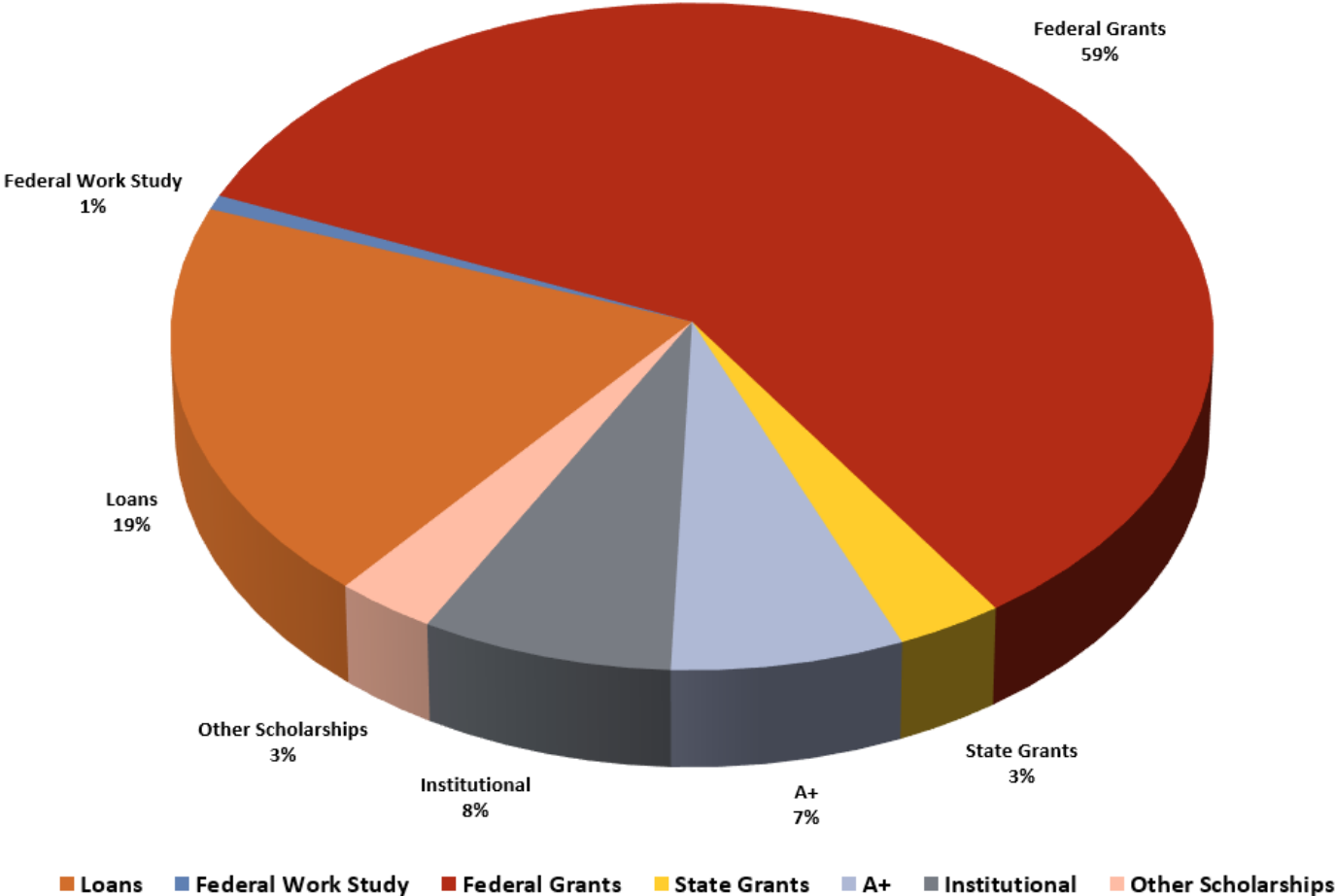

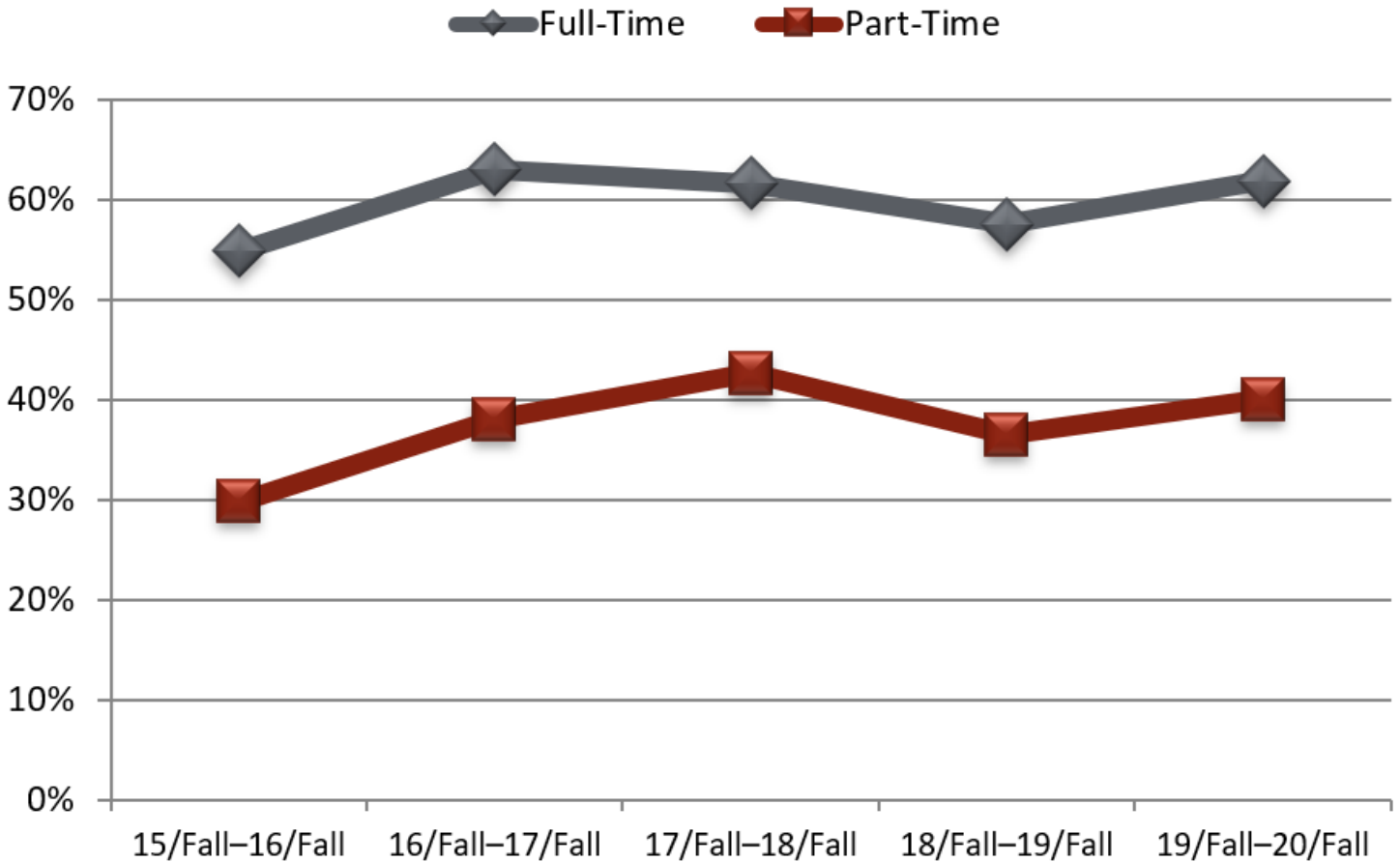
PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL DOLLARS AWARDED

FIRST-TIME STUDENT COHORT*



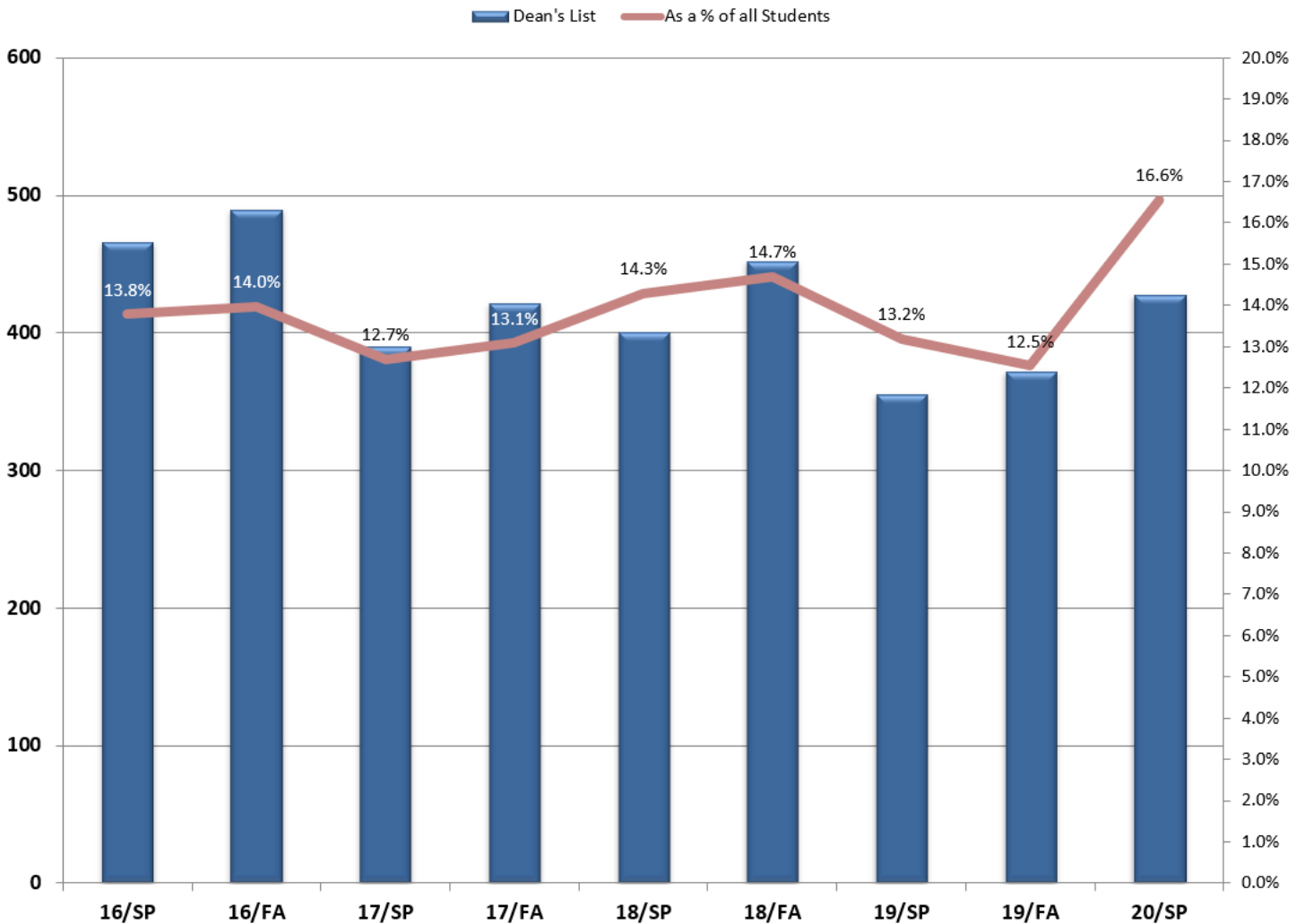

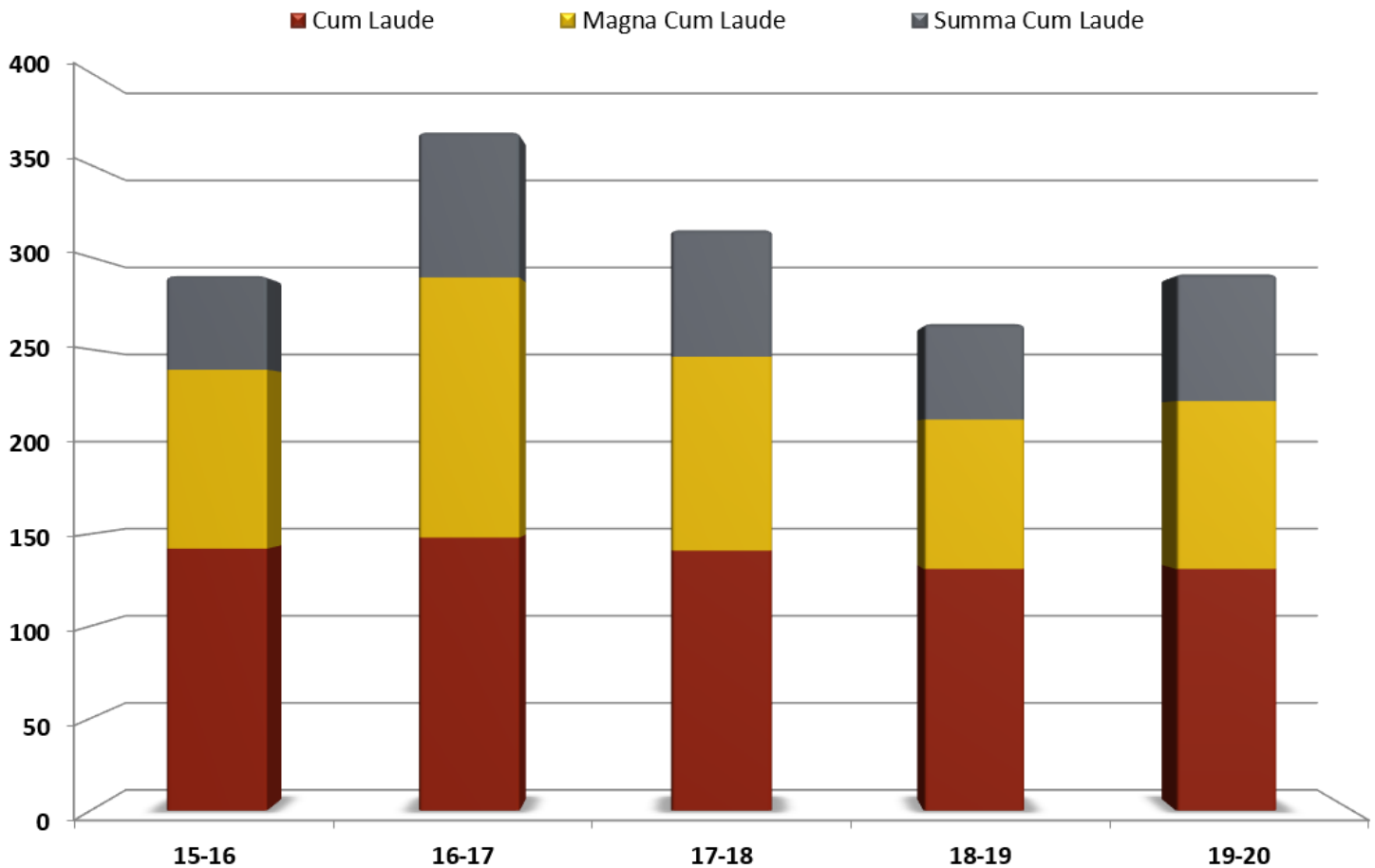

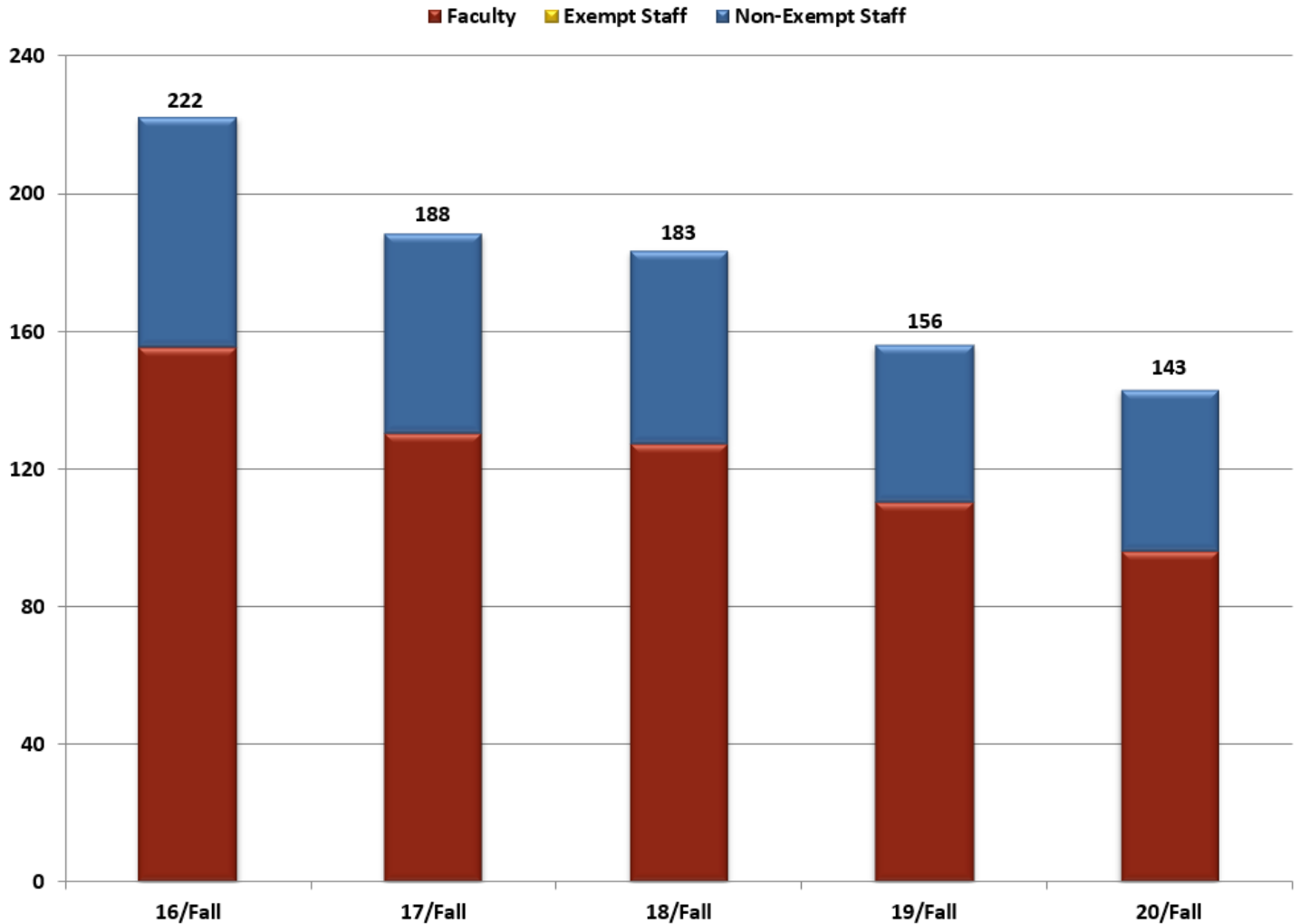

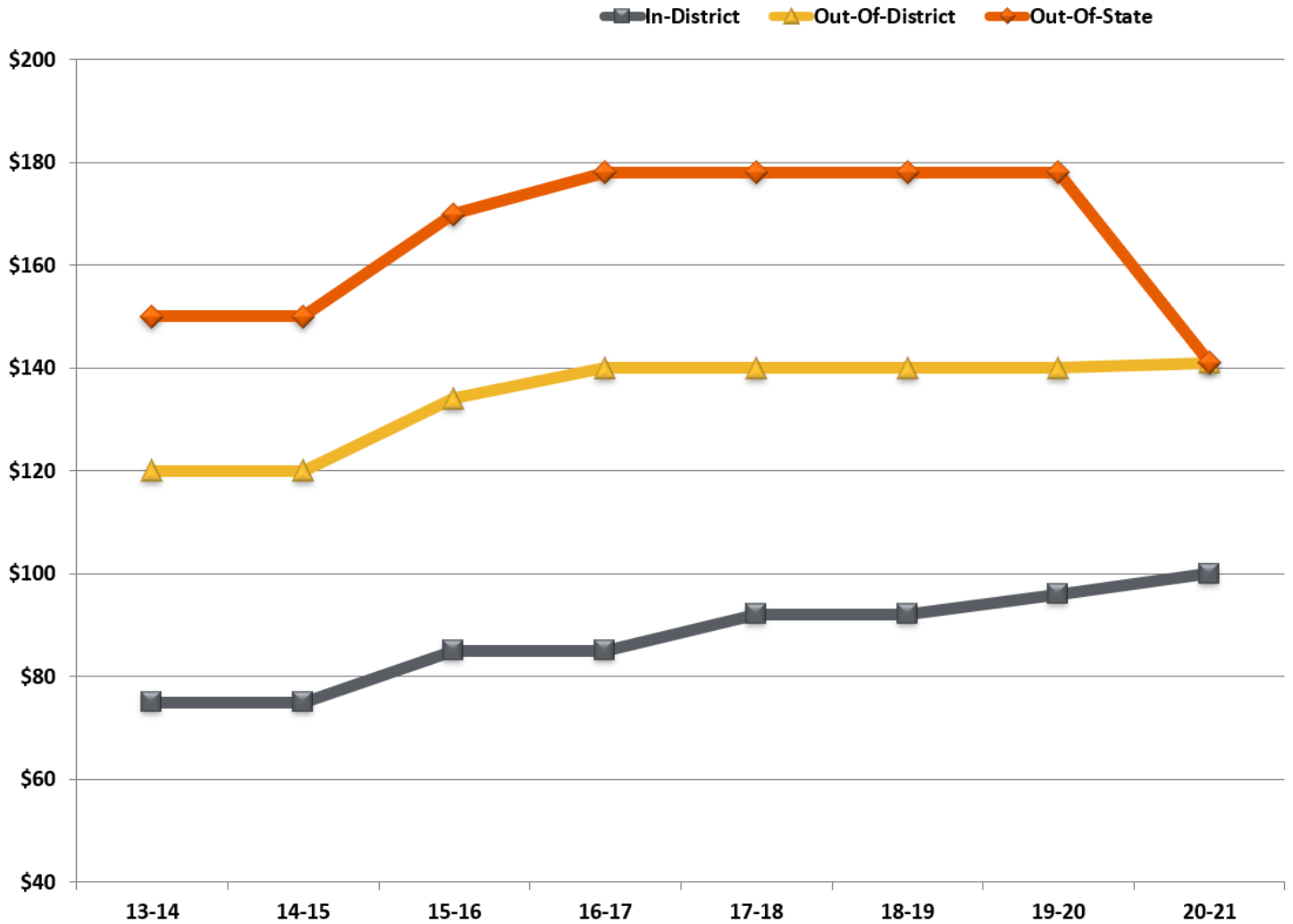

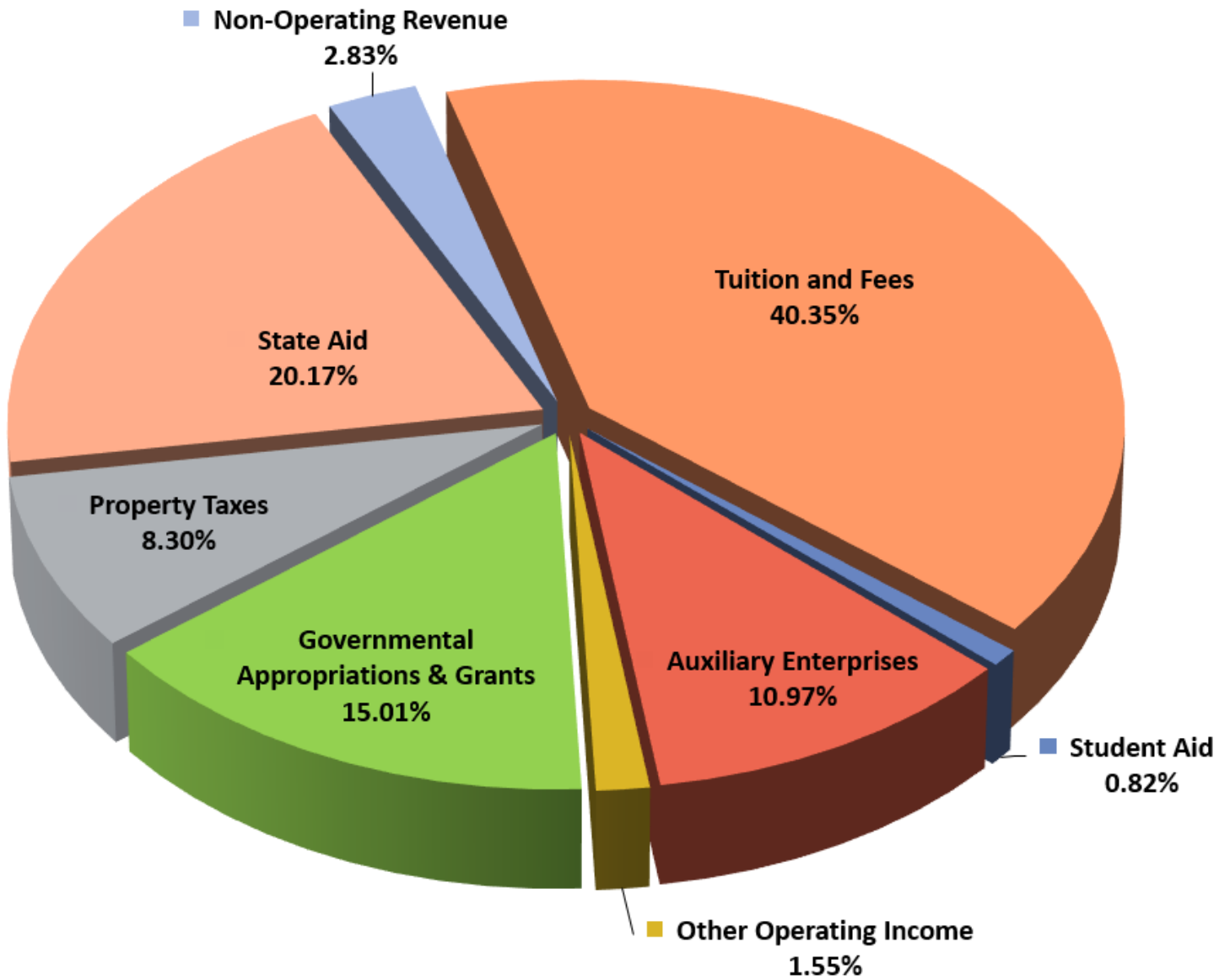
